

Cap Able to Be Out

Captain B. L. Snow is able to be out again. He suffered an accident on the 10th of December that caused his enforced hibernation in his home for 27 days. He gives the following account of his accident: He was about to board an Oregon City car at Alder and Second street, Portland. The car was just about to start. Another man had just preceded him to the platform, and the Captain placed one foot on the step and was about to swing himself onto the platform when the car started with a jerk. Mr. Snow had one arm full of bundles and with the other had a grip on the car. The sudden start threw him off and he fell heavily to the hard pavement. With difficulty he was able to scramble up, and he sent for his physician, in St. Johns. When the physician arrived he failed to make a physical examination, and thought the captain would get along all right after his nerves had become settled. Later in the presence of a railway official the same physician stated that no bones were broken and that the captain was getting along finely. Mr. Snow offered to settle with the street car company at the time for fifty dollars, but this was deemed too high. Later it was discovered that Mr. Snow had sustained a broken rib and that his left collar bone was also broken. He now proposes to bring suit against the company for damages in a much larger sum than his original offer.

To Tax Bachelors

The introduction of a bill calculated to start a stampede for Hymen's altar is being considered by Representative J. H. Nolte of Multnomah county. The bill, as contemplated, proposes not only a tax on the annual income of every unmarried man over the age of 21 years in the State of Oregon. Another provision is that a man who is contributing to the support or maintenance of a divorced wife, or to the support or maintenance of a child or children by a wife divorced or deceased shall be exempt. A bachelor who shall marry in the interval between having his income assessed and tax paying time shall upon exhibition of evidence to the Sheriff, have that portion of his taxes due to his former celibacy cancelled. This feature is expected greatly to accelerate one branch of business in the county clerk's office. The Sheriff, however, under the provisions of the proposed law, is not authorized to accept an announcement of engagement or intention to marry as a cause for cancellation of the bachelor tax. —Portland daily.
