Want Better Car Service

Better car service was the theme discussed at the regular meeting of the St. Johns Commercial club Wednesday evening. Messrs. Ketchum, Dotson and Randall of the Portsmouth Push club were present and discussed at length the plans they had devised for securing same. Mr. Ketchum stated that poor car service was the greatest draw back to development of the Peninsula of any, and he asked the co-operation of the St. Johns club in circulating petitions demanding better and more direct service. Single cars, not less frequent service than ten minutes and routed over the L line and Broadway bridge when completed, are the most potent features to be demanded. And it is supposed that if the petitions prove unavailing that the Northwestern Electric Co. shall be used as club, and as a final resort that the matter be placed before the Railway Commission. It was stated that St. Johns was discriminated against in that other suburbs enjoyed far better service, even though they lie farther away from the business center of Portland. The local club decided to circulate petitions with an amendment to the three features mentioned, namely, individual and independent car service on the loop which begins at Wall street and encircles the lower Peninsula.

Single cars also will be demanded. Mr. Randall had figures to prove that it required appreciably less time to travel over the L line than via Union avenue. The fire department, with P. G. Gilmore as spokesman, asked co-operation of the club in securing a team of horses and better equipment, and it was decided that a committee from the department meet with the board of governors of the club and decide upon just what would be required, so that the matter could be presented to the city council in tangible form.

A committee consisting of S.L. Dobie, O. J. Gatzmeyer, C. A. Fry, Thomas Autzen and Sumner Newell was appointed to devise ways and means of creating greater interest in the club and financing same for another year. Several of the business men agreed to provide sign boards directing strangers to the ferry landing.

The committee on ferry service reported that twenty minute service had been inaugurated, and that it was giving general satisfaction.


