where the father and mother study each other's happiness, never failing in the small courtesies and little acts that cheer and brighten the life, and very early in life the lesson of helpfulness should be taught the child. As soon as strength and reasoning powers are sufficiently developed he should be given duties to perform in the home. He should be encouraged in trying to help father and mother, encouraged to deny and control himself, to put other's happiness and convenience before his own and to watch for opportunities to cheer and assist brothers and sisters and playmates.

How many cases we see of children who do not seem to appreciate their parents. It is generally because they have had too much done for them, and nothing expected in return. This is one of the commonest phases of selfishness among parents. If they really loved their children they would not rob them of their opportunity of doing for others. They would not bring them up selfishly to learn bitter lessons in after life. And what about the selfish wife—does she send her husband out in the morning with ambition to deal righteously and work out his worldly destiny with some glow of truth in it, or does she only look to what pleasure and plenty he can bring her, never questioning whence they come? How many women even inform themselves as to what their husband's temptations are—temptations to make money, unprincipled methods. How many women when they spend a dollar ask what brought it? Was it paid for by strained vitality, was it gained at the expense of the husband's soul? Oh, how many, many times the father is looked upon only as the bread winner. He is not taken into account in the little every day plans, the pleasant little times in the home are not planned for at a time when he can be present. Oh, too many times the mother and the children are away for the summer, the father cannot leave his work for so long and thus he is left to battle with temptations, which in all probability would not have assailed him had his family been at home. With a little loving thoughtfulness, a shorter vacation might have been planned when all could have enjoyed it together.

We have undertaken a tremendous work when we have undertaken to raise a child, but one which will bring the sweetest fruits if well done. It is not what we give our children, but what we make them capable of that is their inheritance. It is better that our children have self control than they have bread, and they will never gain it, except through the noble example of their parents whom their young hearts adore.

The restoring and uplifting of humanity begins in the home, the work of the parents underlying every other.

The poet Browning has said a "man's wife should be his star of aspiration," so likewise a woman's husband should be her sun, whose light and intelligence are her directing genius. We must begin at the source of things if we would build for eternity and if we desire true results as Christians we can find the source only in God, and the spiritual unity of human life.

Woman should fill the position which God originally designed for her, as her husband's equal. The world needs mothers who are not mothers only in name, but in every sense of the word. Let woman realize the sacredness of her work and in the strength and fear of God take up her life mission, let her educate her children for usefulness in this world and for a home in the world to come.

The wisest man that ever lived said "A prudent wife is from the Lord, the heart of her husband doth safely trust in her; she will do him good and not evil all the days of her life. Her children arise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praiseth her."
