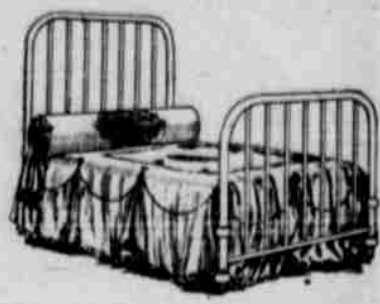


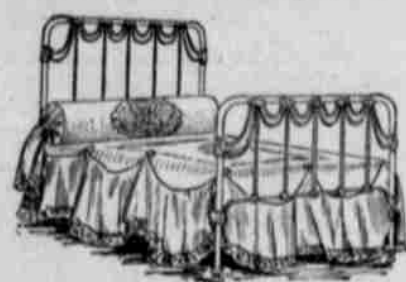

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns, Oregon: That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Smith avenue from the southeast line of Oswego street to the northwest line of Columbia boulevard in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit:

By grading said portion of said street to the sub-grade established and by paving said street with gravel bitulithic pavement twenty feet in width together with the necessary sub-drains.

Work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed pro rata and as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said street from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be Local Improvement district No. 97.

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said Smith avenue is \$11,135.62.

That the cost of said street be assessed against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the charter of the city of St. Johns.

Adopted by the council this 8th day of April, 1913.
