The High School debating team has been remarkably successful this season. By winning four debates from the following schools, Astoria, St. Helens, Parkplace and Woodburn, our team won the Columbia River district championship. The prospects are bright for winning the state championship, as there are only three teams in the race, all the others having been eliminated. The team is composed of Edna Hollenbeck, Lorena Rawson and Basil Smith, alternate. Strenuous and conscientious effort has been put forth by the team and coach and the student body is enthusiastic in expressing their belief that we will win.

James John debates the negative side of the question, resolved "That the United States shall maintain a large navy." The state is divided into four districts, namely: Southern Oregon, Coos Bay, Central Oregon and Columbia River. North Bend, representing the Coos Bay district, defeated Klamath Falls of the Southern Oregon district, and will meet the winner of the Springfield-St. Johns debate at the State University, Eugene, May 8th.

The record that the team made is one of which the school feels proud, and it also indicates that the team is composed of capable debaters, insuring an interesting and exciting contest. No admission fee will be charged, and it is hoped that every student and many citizens will lend their presence to give the team the necessary support to defeat their opponent and bring new laurels to the school and city.—Reporter.

The Bonville System

The greatest disaster of past mistakes would be to allow the memory of them to discourage us from seizing future opportunity. The baby of yesterday has blurred eyes, distorted face and a broken milk bottle, and arms toward mother. The man of the hour has a sparkle in his eye, a purpose on his face, a telescope in his hand and is facing the future. Past mistakes are of future value only as we purge them from our present and future principles. The overwhelming sacrifice of the American people's money and public rights to private interests, resulting from lax business methods, has flowed in with such volume as to create chaos and confusion. To erect headstones or keep records of these disasters is out of the question.

The item appearing in the St. Johns Review March 28th under the heading "Co-operative Store Failure" and referring to some remote concern of which the date was not important, but simply outlines that a \$4000 co-operative company was closed out by court procedure for a default of only \$322. Such unjust warfare has ever aggressed against any and every effort for the establishment of any humane universally just industrial or social principle. The excessive tyranny of capitalistic methods has been both school and teacher and now is demonstrator to the fast advancing class that are preparing the foundation for universal justice.

Well do they realize that an exterior possible of penetration from without is doomed. Well do they realize that an interior subject to disease is doomed. The great onslaught of corporate disaster has seared in the people's minds the overwhelming necessity for protection, and their ardent search has revealed properly protected and organized co-operation as the only possible solution.

Had the Cleveland concern referred to been prohibited from assuming any liabilities whatever it could not have been closed out for a small debt.
