People on the streets about 9:30 Wednesday evening were greeted by one of the strangest processions that ever came down the pike. Before the procession concluded its line of march it had been augmented by the entire wedding party, all of whom enjoyed the unprecedented occurrence as much as the Bachelors. It will be a long time before Mr. Truman will fail to remember the incidents attendant upon his transformation from bachelorhood to the Benedict ranks.
