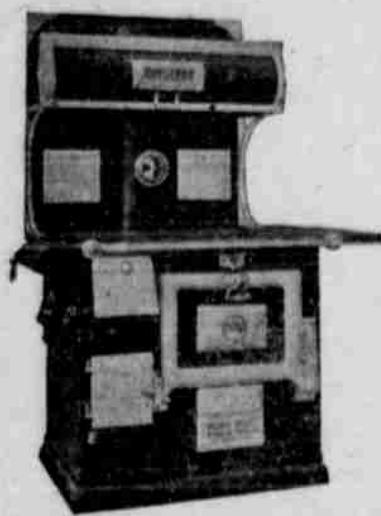

Bicycle Ordinance No. 193

Section 5: Before any person shall be permitted to ride any bicycle or other vehicle of like character on any sidewalk on any street in the City of St. Johns, he or she shall first secure a permit therefor from the City Recorder, for which permit he or she shall pay the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00), which permit shall expire the first Monday of April of each year. On receipt of the payment herein described the Recorder shall issue to the applicant a receipt and metal tag bearing the name of the City and number of permit, which permits shall run in consecutive order from Number 1 upward, and be issued in new series each year. At the date of issue the Recorder shall register in the license register the number of each permit, the date of issue and the name of the person to whom issued. The metal tag in this section described shall be conspicuously placed on any bicycle or other like vehicle to be ridden, as in this ordinance provided, and any bicycle or like vehicle being ridden more than once on the streets without such tag from and after the 11th day of September, 1908, shall subject the rider to the penalties prescribed in this ordinance. Provided, however, that physicians in discharge of their professional duties may use any walk by showing proper regard for the speed limit.

A petition for the organization of an Oregon National Guard company in St. Johns has been circulated here, and over 100 signatures have been secured. In all probability St. Johns will have a full fledged militia company in a short time.

An Oregon lad beat the best record made in England in raising the greatest number of potatoes from a single tuber. An English boy raised 220 pounds from 11 potatoes, and the English papers saw something in that to crow about. An Albany boy winning the state contest among school children last year grew 660 pounds from one potato by transplanting sprouts from the original, which had 13 eyes.
