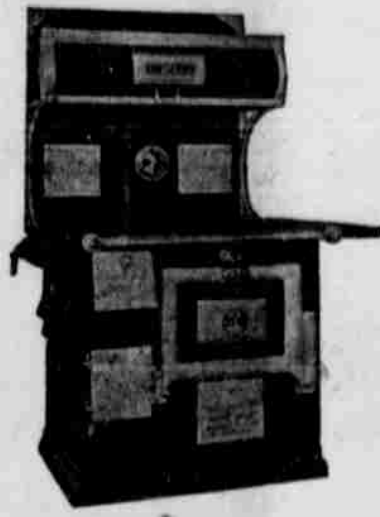

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ORDINANCE NO. 543

An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving Fessenden Street from the Northernly Side Line of Jersey Street to the Northernly Side Line of Smith Avenue in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving Fessenden street from the northernly side line of Jersey street to the northernly side line of Smith avenue, in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in manner provided by Ordinance No. 491 to be the sum of \$5,431.65, and that the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof of or parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement and in just proportion to such benefits, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof of or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll and said assessment roll, which is numbered 94, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns, Oregon:

That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Richmond street from the East property line of Willamette boulevard on the south side of Richmond street to a point 326 feet west from the easterly property line of Bradford street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit:

By grading said portion of said street to grade or sub-grade to be established, and by laying a standard concrete pavement.

Work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.

That the cost of said improvement to be assessed on a pro rata except extra to be assessed against property especially benefited thereby as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots parts of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said street from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.

That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be Local Improvement district No. 99.

That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said street is \$11,176.81.

That the cost of said street be assessed on a pro rata basis against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the charter of the city of St. Johns.

Adopted by the council this 27th day of May, 1913.
