PROPOSALS FOR IMPROVEMENT BONDS

City of St. Johns, Ore.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned at his office in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, until six p. m. on the 5th day of August, 1913 for the sale of the whole or any part of Bonds of the City of St. Johns, issued under Ordinance No. 550 at not less than par and accrued interest.

Said bonds to be dated as follows: \$4721.98, June 4, 1913; \$575.01, June 20, 1913. Amounting in all to \$5296.99.

All of said bonds are issued in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars or less and all of the said bonds are payable ten years after date of said bonds. All of said bonds are coupon bonds bearing interest at the rate of six per cent payable semi-annually, subject to all the conditions imposed, directed and stipulated by Section 131 of the Charter of the City of St. Johns.

The right is reserved to redeem any and all bonds at any interest paying period at or after one year from date.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check for two per cent of the amount of the bid, and the said check shall be retained by the City of St. Johns as damages in case the bidder to whom the bonds are awarded fails to accept and pay for the same within fifteen days after the acceptance of the bid. The money is to be paid and the bonds are to be delivered at St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns, Oregon:
That it deems it expedient and necessary to improve Fox street from the North line of Charleston street to the south line of Oswego street in the city of St. Johns in the following manner, to wit:
By grading said portion of street to grade or subgrade to be established, and by laying a five foot cement sidewalk to be laid to property line and by constructing an eight foot cement curb on both sides of said street, with necessary cement crosswalks and corrugated iron gutters.
Work to be done according to the plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder relative thereto, which said plans and specifications and estimates are satisfactory and are hereby approved. Said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of St. Johns, and under the supervision and direction of the city engineer.
That the cost of said improvement to be assessed pro rata as provided by the city charter upon the property especially and particularly benefited thereby, and which is hereby declared to be all of lots, blocks and parcels of land between the termini of such improvements abutting upon, adjacent or proximate to said street from the marginal lines of said street back to the center of the block or blocks or tracts of land abutting thereon or proximate thereto.
That all the property included in said improvement district aforesaid is hereby declared to be Local Improvement district No. 101.
That the city engineer's assessment of the probable total cost of said improvement of said street is \$1237.84.
That the cost of said street to be assessed on a pro rata basis against the property in said local assessment district as provided by the charter of the city of St. Johns.

ORDINANCE NO. 550

AN ORDINANCE DIRECTING AND REQUIRING THE CITY RECORDER TO SELL CERTAIN IMPROVEMENT BONDS OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, MULTNOMAH COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON, IN THE SUM OF \$5,296.99, IN DENOMINATIONS OF FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS EACH OR LESS.

The City of St. Johns Does Ordain as Follows:

That, whereas, under the provisions of the charter of the City of St. Johns, pertaining to said improvement bonds and sale thereof, applications have been filed with the City Recorder by interested parties under said Charter and the bonding provisions thereof, aggregating the sum of \$5,296.99 for street improvements in the City of St. Johns, and,

Whereas, under the said Charter and its provisions the bond lien docket has been made up, and,

Whereas, the Council is hereby authorized to issue the bonds in denominations not exceeding the sum of five hundred dollars each, and in all equal to the total amount of the unpaid assessments, and,

Whereas, there is unpaid assessments for which bonding applications have been made in the sum of \$5,296.99, and,

Whereas, it is provided that bonds by their terms shall mature in ten years from the date of the said bonds and be payable in gold of the United States, and bear interest at the rate of not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to the said bonds.
Now, therefore, the City of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the City Recorder of the City of St. Johns be, and he is hereby, ordered, directed and required to issue twelve bonds, which shall be improvement bonds of the City of St. Johns, Multnomah county, Oregon, and which said bonds and coupons thereof shall be properly signed as required by law and the charter of the City of St. Johns, and which said bonds shall be in the following numbers, dates and denominations:
