Tuesday morning the service of the St. Johns ferry has been materially improved. The ferry now and Saturdays.

Of interest to every community in the Columbia River Basin is the announcement made within the past few days by Major McIndoe, U. S. Corps of Engineers, that work on the north jetty at the mouth of the Columbia will be commenced in October. The original estimate of \$1,000,000 as the cost of this improvement has been increased to \$6,000,000, and it is expected that 5,000,000 tons of rock will be required in the work. The Government officials have announced that the south jetty, which was commenced in 1885, is now complete and that the task of transferring the equipment to the north side of the river will be taken up at once. It is expected that confining the current to the narrow channel between the two jetties will result in a permanent depth of not less than 40 feet on the bar.
