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The hard surfacing of the connecting link between the St. Johns city limits on Dawson street and Lombard street has been completed, furnishing hard surface roadway from the heart of St. Johns to the heart of Portland. It is something that the citizens of St. Johns can view with a great deal of pride, and is a feature that this city has longed to attain for many years. It was only through the financial assistance of a few of our enterprising citizens and business men that a hard surface thoroughfare has been made possible. The late city council was a large and requisite factor in the improvement of Dawson street by supplying the deficiency in excess cost of improvement out of the general fund, and pushing the work along. That it will mean much to the future welfare of St. Johns is undoubted.

Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, has visited Oregon in his official capacity and has proceeded on his way to other sections of his great field where worries and troubles are as insistent as in this state. His stay in Oregon, brief though it was, has left hundreds of homesteaders and settlers with lighter hearts and a renewed courage to tackle the obstacles to their future progress which before his coming seemed insurmountable. For the secretary has made it clear that the Government stands ready to cooperate with the state of Oregon in the reclamation of its arid lands and has promised that all honest, bona fide settlers shall be entitled to the protection of the Federal Government whenever their interests are menaced by land sharks or unscrupulous promoters.

"The policy at Washington in the past has been to let any one have the country that wanted it," said Mr. Lane in the course of address to the settlers of the Redmond country. "Now our problem is to make life easier for the greatest possible number of people on the land. If it can be irrigated at reasonable cost, you will see this great district covered with irrigation projects within the next few years."

Notice of Cost of Improvement

Notice is hereby given that the assessment for the improvement of Fessenden street from Oswego street to Smith avenue, the cost of which is \$10,718.10, was declared by Ordinance No. 560, entitled "An Ordinance declaring the cost of improving Fessenden street from the west side line of Oswego street to Smith avenue, and assessing the property benefited thereby, declaring such assessment and directing the entry of the same in the docket of city liens." The cost of said improvement is levied upon all the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land within the boundaries of the district described as follows: Between the west side of Oswego street and Smith avenue.

A statement of such assessment has been entered in the docket of city liens September 3rd, 1913, and said assessment is now due and payable at the office of the recorder of the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and will be delinquent and bear interest after Sept. 13, 1913, and if not paid on or before Oct. 3rd, 1913, proceedings will be taken for the collection of the same by sale of property as provided by the city charter.

ORDINANCE NO. 560

An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving Fessenden Street from the West Side Line of Oswego Street to the Side Line of Smith Avenue in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving Fessenden street from the west side line of Oswego street to the side line of Smith avenue, in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby certifies, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in manner provided by Ordinance No. 535 to be the sum of \$10,718.10, and that the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof or of parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement and in just proportion to such benefits, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll and said assessment roll, which is numbered 96, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:
