Continue to Plan

The Bible School of the Church of Christ held their regular Workers' conference Tuesday evening. The main object for discussion was plans for their Rally Day services, to be held Sunday, October 5th, at which time they expect at least 500 to be in attendance. Reports of committees were heard and suggestions as to future work made. It is planned that they shall invite the President of the Commercial Club, Chairman of the School Board and Mayor Bredeson to give short addresses on this occasion. Mayor Albee of Portland will also be asked to be in attendance and make a talk along with other prominent people of the state.

The services will probably be held in the High School auditorium, provided proper arrangements can be made. One object of this Rally Day service so planned is to show that they are working in harmony with the Commercial Club for the advancement of St. Johns; that they desire to assist the mayor and council in the establishment of good government, and that they are attempting to keep abreast with the advancements made by the public schools along educational lines in teaching.

The school is divided into different departments with superintendents for each department having their separate teachers nearly all of them being graduates of the teachers' training course. The school will be re-organized after October 5th, and will contain about 24 classes with a trained teacher at head of each class.

The Christian Endeavor of the Church of Christ gave a Labor Day picnic and lunch excursion Monday. A goodly number of the young folks were in the party, with Rev. J. R. Johnson and wife as chaperones. They left at about 9:30 a. m. on the launch for Sanvies Island with plenty of provisions to last out the day. After disembarking, some made preparation for dinner, while others explored the island around the camp. One of the features of the dinner, which was served in royal style and fit for any king, having been prepared by the young ladies, was a large steel head salmon which had been caught on a silver hook while on the way, and fried to the queen's taste. After dinner base ball, croquet and other games were enjoyed. Lunch was again prepared at 7:30, after which a large bonfire was built on the beach and songs and stories were entered into with much enjoyment. The party returned at 10:30, very enthusiastic over the day of pleasure, and will not forget it for some time—at least until the sunburn and soreness wears away.
