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It seems to be a foregone conclusion that Multnomah county will vote \$1,250,000 bonds toward the construction of the Interstate Bridge. There is not one good reason why any one should vote against it, and we have yet to hear of a single person opposing the proposition.

The same is true of smaller cities and towns. The successful merchants are the advertisers. The advertiser stamps himself as one having confidence in himself and his wares, as one proud of his calling and seeking publicity and the test of patronage.

It is a matter of sincere regret to many of our citizens that the city council could not see their way clear to improve Willamette boulevard from Richmond street on the south to St. Johns avenue on the north, which had been petitioned for. But the council decided that the excess was more than could be provided for out of the general city funds. In view of the fact that the city had purchased the Smith property at the corner of Burlington and Willamette boulevard in order that the street might be improved in more perfect manner, and that A. S. Benson paid the sum of \$200 to remove a jog in the street, it is a pity that the work could not proceed. Portland has provided for hard surfacing of the boulevard to the St. Johns city line and it is to be regretted that a large portion of this great scenic boulevard could not have been undertaken by this city. The total excess as estimated by the city engineer will be about \$1800 and the improvement cost near \$25,000, which would have furnished work for a large body of laborers this Fall. There is also the chance that the excess would be considerably reduced by the bidders, as they usually bid from 15 to 20 per cent below the engineer's estimate and it often happens that the engineer's estimate of the number of yards of dirt to be removed is in excess of what actually are removed. Also, in any event the city will have an excess to pay on the Smith property. So it is more than likely that the excess would not be over \$1000 at the outside, probably less. But the council has deemed it best that the improvement be not undertaken this year, but will more than likely be taken up again in the Spring.

T. R. Wisby, a pioneer citizen of St. Johns, died at his residence on Mohawk street Sunday, September 21, at 10:30 o'clock after a lingering illness of cancer. He lacked about two months of being four score years of age, was born in the state of Indiana and had resided in Oregon for the past 24 years. He was a member of the Methodist church and also of the G. A. R. The deceased leaves a widow and five daughters, viz: Mrs. Lois Evans of Medford, Oregon; Mrs. Lola Lindley of St. Johns; Mrs. Wm. Bullock of Edna, Wash.; Mrs. Delia Kearns of Ranier, Oregon, and Mrs. Geo. Beauchamp of Medford, Oregon, besides a host of friends to mourn his demise.

The funeral services were conducted at the Blackburn Undertaking parlors Monday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. J. R. Johnson of the Church of Christ officiating. Interment was made in Columbia cemetery, the G. A. R. and W. R. C. being in charge.

**ORDINANCE NO. 564**

**An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving Richmond Street from the North Side Line of Smith Avenue to the South Side Line of Fessenden Street in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.**

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows: That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving Richmond street from the north side line of Smith avenue to the south side line of Fessenden street, in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in manner provided by Ordinance No. 542 to be the sum of \$2068.16, and that the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll, and said assessment roll, which is numbered 97, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:
