The people of St. Johns should
patronize the Lyceum course in-
stituted by the High School. It
is a meritorious effort on the
part of the School to interest
and instruct and entertain the
people of our city, and the pro-
moters assume grave responsibil-
ity in the undertaking. A guar-
antee must be given to secure
the course, and the School pled-
ges its faith in the patronage of
the people in assuming this re-
sponsibility. It is not a money
making scheme. Last year after
an arduous campaign only eight
dollars were left in the treasury
after all expenses were paid,
and the school was not com-
pensated for the labor ex-
pended on their venture. This
year a course of six numbers
have been secured, all first class
and especial care taken in the
selection. And it is now up to
the people to show their appre-
ciation of the efforts made to en-
tertain and interest them in
clean and wholesome attractions.
Every household should be pro-
vided with a ticket. Make the
burden of the School less ardu-
ous and the responsibility less
heavy to bear by responding
readily and cheerfully when tick-
ets are offered for sale. It is a
duty the people owe the Schools.
Show them that their efforts are
fully appreciated.

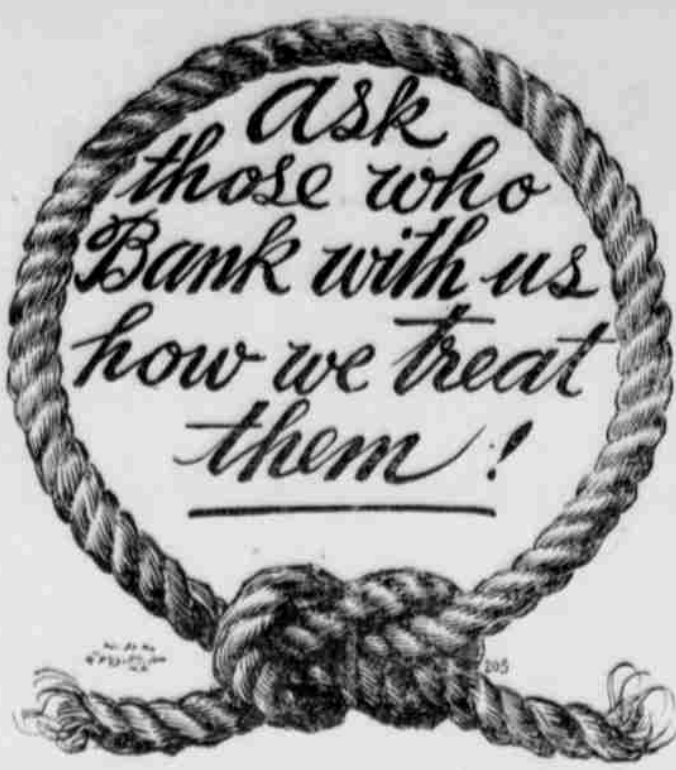
A remarkable record has been
made the past Summer in keep-
ing down forest fires in the great
timber areas of the Northwest,
it being stated on good author-
ity that the total loss will fall
under 3,000,000 feet with a valua-
tion less than \$5,000, this in
comparison with the former low
record of 25,000,000 feet in 1911.
This splendid showing was made
possible by the active coopera-
tion of railroads, loggers, camp-
ers and land owners with the
Government rangers and the
promptness with which all small
blazes have been located and put
out.

At the Salem Fair, which has
just closed the most prosperous
session ever held, Douglas County
took first prize for the best
county display, forcing Benton
County, five times winner of the
annual contest, to take second
place. The decision was a very
close one, the judges having
been for some time undecided as
to which display was the best,
the splendid showing of corn in
the Douglas County booth being
the final deciding factor. Clack-
amas County fourth, Linn fifth,
Tillamook sixth and Polk County
seventh. Certainly no better
county exhibits have ever before
been made at the State Fair.

Planning to organize a move-
ment for the development of the
territory surrounding each of
the commercial clubs throughout
the state, Tom Richardson, who
has probably engineered more
such undertakings than any other
one man in the United States,
has been engaged by the Execu-
tive Committee of the Portland
Commercial Club to give the
greater portion of his time to
this line of work in the future.
With the development of each
community in the state to its
greatest possible extent as its
object, Mr. Richardson will de-
vote his energies and his experi-
ence to assisting each individual
commercial body in raising
funds and in inaugurating a
campaign wide in scope and ag-
gressive in character for the bet-
terment of their own home ter-
ritory. One of the main ideas in
this work will be to place the
idle lands of the state within
reach of homeseekers at reason-
able prices and, when establish-
ed on the land, the newcomer
will be assisted in every possible
way to make a success of his
venture. If Oregon is to profit
by the great movement of tour-
ists to the Coast in 1915, each
community should commence
preparations to that end at once.
