

Sensible Health Hints

With the approach of winter City Health Officer Marcellus has issued a set of winter health hints for distribution to the public. His suggestions are as follows:

Not too heavy, but warm clothing. Keep the feet dry—better be barefooted than with wet shoes and stockings. If perspiring freely, don't go out into cold or damp air. The house should be frequently ventilated fresh air is just as essential in winter as in summer. A sore throat, no matter how mild, should receive attention—it may be diphtheria or scarlet fever. Closing the windows to keep out colds merely serves to cause colds. People who get plenty of fresh air seldom, if ever, are troubled by colds. Colds are infectious. When you contract one be careful not to pass it along. The mother with a cold should not caress her children. The cold is likely to be passed along. The problem of keeping the house warm and the air pure is a difficult one. Warmth is essential, but pure air is more so. The system of heating the house should not include closing of the windows. If you enter a public or private place that is hot, close and unventilated, get out as quickly as possible. The air in such a place is freighted with poisons. The necessity of keeping the body clean is just as great in cold weather as in warm. Don't take a hot bath and then go out immediately into the cold air. Much, perhaps, most of cold weather sickness is caused by lack of proper exercise and fresh air.

An Ordinance Declaring the Cost of Improving Fox Street from the North Side Line of Charleston Street to the South Side Line of Oswego Street, in the City of St. Johns, Oregon, and Assessing the Property Benefited Thereby, Declaring Such Assessment and Directing the Entry of the Same in the Docket of City Liens.

The city of St. Johns does obtain as follows: That the council has considered the proposed assessment for improving Fox street from the north side line of Charleston street to the south side line of Oswego street, in the city of St. Johns, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in manner provided by Ordinance No. 554 to be the sum of \$948.02, and that the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or part thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district, by reason of said improvement and in just proportion to such benefits, are in the respective amounts set opposite the number or description of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land in the following annexed assessment roll, and said assessment roll, which is numbered 98, is hereby adopted and approved as the assessment for said improvement, and the recorder of the city of St. Johns is directed to enter a statement of the assessment hereby made in the docket of city liens, and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by charter, which assessment is as follows:

Separate winter wraps are not the nondescript garments of some seasons ago, but in line and materials are quite as smart as the smartest gowns, showing the same general silhouette. The vogue of the one-piece dress is responsible for the awakened interest in these coats and for the subsequent novel designs and trimmings that have been called forth to make them attractive. Among the new materials is a heavy, sack-like fabric resembling closely ratine. It is excellent for motor or general utility wear. Ratine is still a favorite, and most effective trimmings of suede are seen on many of the ratine models. Boucle is warm and serviceable for juniors and the soft woolens also in the warm, bright colorings so much used in sports coats this summer, the blues, scarlets and green, are most becoming and suitable. To copy No. 7982 in size 16 it will require 3 1/2 yards of 42 inch material. In planning school frocks for the kiddie matters are simplified if cotton fabrics are used rather than the woolen stuffs. These are easy to keep fresh and clean and under a warm coat may be worn in the coldest weather. 7986 is a design suitable for any of the occasions or for a serge.
