

**NORWAY'S INCOME TAX.**

It Reaches All Taxpayers In Excess of \$3000 Per Year.

How about you? Do you pay an income tax on your income? If you were a Norwegian living in Norway and earning \$3000 a year you would be taxed on one-half of it if you were unmarried, on about one-quarter of it if you were married and had no children. If you had children you still would be taxed on one-third of it.

With an income of \$3000 a year you would be taxed if unmarried no more than half of your income, if married and having no children no more than one-third of your income, having one child no more than one-quarter of your income, and if you had more children you still would be taxed on one-third of your income.

Unmarried and having no income of \$2000 a year in Norway your income tax payment would be \$225.00; married with one child \$200.00; married with six children \$225.00. All that you would get all year long, \$225.00, married for having six children would be \$200.00; all that you would get all year long for more children would be \$225.00 and six children.

Married or unmarried in Norway you could escape paying an income tax only by having an income less than \$2000 a year. Think of having an income tax out of earnings of \$7 a month.—New York Press.

**TAFETAS, FLOWERED AND PLAIN, FAVORED FOR AFTERNOON FROCKS.**

Every season there is a rumor that taffetas will be worn but, for some reason or other, American women have always refused to take them up to any extent. This season, however, it looks as if they were going to. These new taffetas are of wonderful quality; supple enough to be crushed in the hands like chiffon. There is an American made taffeta called "Pussy Willow" that is quite as perfect as it is possible to make it. The French houses are using certain and charming tints for evening and the darker shades—tete de negre, blue and wine color—for daytime wear.

It is an effective fad to combine chiffon with taffetas as illustrated in No. 3122. This is an afternoon dress of tete de negre figured taffetas with bodice and tunic of chiffon, in the same shade; the flounce at the bottom of the skirt is of chiffon also.

This frock may be copied in size 34 with 5 1/2 yards of 36 inch material.

No. 3061 is also developed in taffetas in a deep, rich shade of bordeaux. There is an unusual slash starting at the front of the bodice, crossing in front and extending around the hips to the back, where it terminates in two long ends. It catches up the tunic over either hip, to give the puffed effect which is a feature of so many of the imported models for spring.
