

Makes Strong Protest

A strong protest from the printing fraternity throughout the country is being waged against the government printed envelopes. If the government did the work at its own printing office it would not seem so "raw." But the government finds that it cannot print the envelopes as cheaply as a corporation can do so, and even so they are furnished to the customer below actual cost.

The postoffice department, with the consent of the government, has entered into a contract with a single large concern for the printing of return cards on stamped envelopes. The postoffice branches take the order of each individual buyer of stamped envelopes and also the order for printing the return address in the corner of the envelope. The postoffice department then, according to its contract, provides the one large concern with the stamped envelopes, which are subsequently forwarded to the individual buyer. The concern holding the contract is relieved of all shipping charges and thus is given a competitive advantage which the small printer is unable to overcome. Printers in general are not claiming the right to print corner cards with the individual address left blank. They admit that it is the government's right to have these printed wherever it sees fit. It is against the printing of the individual addresses, no matter in what city they may be, by this one concern that the printers are protesting. As conditions exist today the government is not alone competing against the small printer by entering his field, taking money out of his town and diverting it into the treasury of one concern, but it does not even permit him to compete. It has entered into a contract which gives one printing plant the sole right to print individual corner cards on stamped envelopes no matter where the individual may live.

RESOLUTION

It is resolved by the City of St. Johns:

That it is deemed necessary and expedient to change the grade on Charleston street between the east side line of Wilamette boulevard and the west side line of Hayes street, to conform to the established grades of the said Wilamette boulevard and Hayes street, and the city engineer is hereby directed to make and file with the City Recorder a profile showing the proposed change of grade, and within three days from the date of the first publication of this resolution the city engineer is further directed to post notices of the change of grade as provided by the charter, setting forth in a brief, concise manner the change of grade proposed, and the time within which written objections or remonstrances against the same may be made.

Notice of Meeting of County Board of Equalization

And it shall be the duty of persons interested to appear at the time and place appointed. If it shall appear to such Board of Equalization that there are any lands or lots or other property assessed twice, or incorrectly assessed as to description or quantity, and in the name of a person or persons not the owner thereof, or assessed under or beyond the actual full cash value thereof, said Board may make proper correction of the same. If it shall appear to such Board that any land, lots or other property assessable by the Assessor are not assessed, such Board shall assess the same at the full cash value thereof.
