The location is the best in the city, and no doubt both establishments will do a good business.

According to plans announced last week by Terry & Harris, incorporated, negotiations are under way for the construction of a group of factory buildings by a syndicate of five Portland capitalists on a site yet to be selected. It is proposed to spend about \$125,000 for the buildings and an additional \$100,000 for machinery equipping the plant for the manufacture of castiron, water and gas pipes and fittings. There will be probably six buildings of reinforced concrete construction, one story high. It is understood that the site of the factory will be on the lower harbor, where adequate facilities are provided. Once the plant is placed in operation it will employ approximately 125 men.—Oregonian.
