State Industrial Notes

Multnomah county tax levy for 1915 is 8.2 mills less than for 1914.
 Lawyers are promoting the creation of the office of public defender for cities and counties, which appears like a good thing. Salaries and expenses of deputy game wardens totalled \$47,000 for this year.
 Polk county has agreed to pay one-third of cost of a \$225,000 steel bridge cross the Willamette at Salem.
 A great achievement of the Fish and Game Commission is to stop the manufacture of buckskin gloves in Oregon.
 The Industrial Welfare Commission holds that the eight hour law must be enforced over the holiday shopping season.
 A plant to manufacture veterinary remedies is to be established in Portland.
 The Commonwealth Conference at Eugene last week endorsed consolidation of all state boards and commissions under a few heads.
 Out of 90 members of the Legislature, 38 are lawyers.
 Negotiations are pending between the Baker Commercial Club and the Union Pacific Railway to establish in Baker two factories, one a wool scouring plant, and the other a furniture factory.
 Five cents for a square meal houses are being established in Portland.
 The Elliott Contracting Company of Portland will build the Vancouver municipal jetty.
 L. Dysinger of Roseburg expects to show a set of furniture made of deer antlers worth \$5,000 at the Panama Exposition.
