Generally Bobs Up

The usual candidate for an economy reputation bobs up at this time of the year to ask repeal of the law for publishing delinquent tax lists. The fact is there should be more, not less publicity in tax lists, and the system should be extended to secure publication of assessment rolls. For instance, at present the tax lists of all delinquents appear in one or two papers published at the county seat, and are all massed together. The delinquent list should be required by law to be made up alphabetically by precincts, and then published by precincts in the nearest papers. As a result delinquent taxpayers would get their notice of delinquency in their local paper if they did not happen to live at the county seat. The county seat papers would still publish the bulk of the delinquent list, but it would be brought home to every part of the county equally. Publication of the assessment rolls before equalization in the same manner has resulted in the digging up of enormous amounts of property. This is the law of a number of states, and the names are published alphabetically by precincts, one column giving personal and the other realty. Thus two persons having the same amount of land in a neighborhood get to see each other's assessment, and they also see who is omitted from the roll. This law has abolished unjust valuations and has placed millions of hitherto unassessed property on the tax rolls, both personal and real. It is not less publicity that is required, but more, and less commissions and boards and taxing bodies is what newspapers are fighting for.—Industrial News Bureau.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Rule 1.—The Lauthers Mercantile Company shall issue votes as per following schedule, excepting as hereafter may be mentioned:

100 votes for \$1.00 on cash sales.

200 for \$1.00 in merchandise paid with due bills.

300 for \$1.00 on payments of old accounts.

200 for \$1.00 on due bills sold.

200 for \$1.00 on bargain and clearance sales.

And votes will be given at the time sales are made only.

In reference to issuing votes

on old accounts, they may be issued for the payment of old accounts, that were incurred prior to this date. Votes will not be given on new charge accounts unless this particular account is paid within thirty days, then votes may be issued if the Lauthers Mercantile Company is willing and so orders.

Rule 2.—Votes will be issued with a time limit of one week, and must be cast in the ballot box, provided for that purpose, before the expiration of the time limit. Before casting votes, make a record for your own guidance. In order to facilitate voting you are requested to place your votes in an envelope and seal it. Please write the number of votes the envelope contains and the name of the candidate you desire to vote for on the outside.

Rule 3.—Employees, clerks and relatives of the merchants and newspaper cannot participate as candidates.

Rule 4.—Merchants shall in no instance issue votes until such votes have been properly stamped with their firm name. Customers should refuse them otherwise.

Rule 5.—The soliciting of votes in the store, in front of store or on premises is prohibited.

Rule 6.—A vote that is scratched or marked in any manner after it leaves the merchant's hands, shall be thrown out, providing this defacing should appear that a figure had been tampered with.

Rule 7.—Six weeks from the opening date candidates will no longer be entered, unless by special arrangement with the merchant.

Rule 8.—Everybody is invited to nominate candidates. All that is necessary is to send in the name of any young lady in the community. This will entitle her to 2000 nominating votes and she will be entered as a candidate.

Rule 9.—Votes are not transferable after being cast.

Rule 10.—Votes that are not properly stamped with the merchant's signature, or votes with the time limit expired, will not be accepted.

Rule 11.—A committee selected by the Lauthers Mercantile Company will count the votes each week and report the results to the St. Johns Review.

The Review gives 2000 votes for each dollar on new and 1000 votes for each dollar for renewals or back subscriptions.
