Assuming that in the near future the present fertile farms of Western Oregon will be in urgent need of fertilizing materials, State Engineer Lewis has recommended that some action be taken to make use of the great kelp beds along the Oregon coast in order to save the enormous amount of potash which is annually going to waste. He states that it is comparatively easy to procure supplies of nitrates and phosphates, but the principal source of potash is now closed by the war. It is believed the kelp beds can be made to produce enough potash for present and future needs and may also open up a new and profitable industry.

There never has been a time in the history of the state when the farmers have had such an opportunity to make money by raising livestock for meat purposes as at present. With an aggregate shortage of over 3,000,000 meat animals approximately 800,000,000 pounds, in the leading packing centers of the United States, it is certain that for some years to come there will not only be an unlimited demand for meat animals, but it is also certain that prices will range high and it is not impossible that all previous records may be broken. It is a fact that nearly all the big cattle ranges of the state have been broken up and that in only a few locations is it possible to find pasturage for large herds, but it is also a fact that the average farm could be made to produce a larger number of animals than is now doing. With the big packers and brokers willing, and anxious to cooperate with reliable farmers in the state in stocking farms and ranches, it would appear that any farmer who fails to take advantage of his opportunities in this direction is making a big mistake. The population of the entire Northwest is increasing at a rapid rate, the people must be supplied with meat, and if Oregon ranches cannot meet the demand it will certainly be met by other states, a large amount of money will be sent away and the meat industry of the state damaged to just that extent.

## CITIZENS OF ST. JOHNS

Should remember that all must register again in order to vote this Spring at the primary and general city election. The books are open now at the city hall. Don't put it off until the last minute. The registration books for the primary election closes the last day of the present month, so register now while you think of it. Remember, last year's registration does not entitle you to vote this year.

There is probability that a vote may be taken on the purchase of the local water plant, so every citizen in St. Johns eligible to vote should register, and not impose on his friends by having to be sworn in on election day. DO IT NOW.

### ORDINANCE NO. 640.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THE TIME AND MANNER OF IMPROVING TYLER STREET FROM DAWSON STREET TO FESSENDEN STREET IN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, OREGON.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:

The Council of the City of St. Johns, having ascertained the cost of improving Tyler street from the North side line of Dawson street to the South side line of Fessenden street in the City of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of the Council of said city, dated on the 29th day of December, 1915, and recorded in the office of the Recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, on the 1st and 8th days of January, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the City Recorder; and legal posting of notices of such improvements, as shown by the affidavit of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, and no sufficient remonstrance having been filed, and as provided by said resolution, the Engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost of said improvement is \$6009.62, but shall be more accurately determined by said Engineer.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at sixty days from the last publication of notice of proposals of said work, which said proposals must be filed with the Recorder of said city on or before the 2nd day of March at eight o'clock, p. m. of said day.

That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the established grade by cut and fill and by sidewalk on either side with 6 foot cement sidewalks 15 foot curbs entire length, together with all necessary cement cross walks and iron gutters, curb to have standard drain tile every fifty feet; hitch rings to be placed in curb as directed by the City Engineer.

The City Recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, the official newspaper, inviting proposals for

making said improvement. Said improvement shall in all respects be done and completed in conformity with the provisions of Ordinances Nos. 160, 302 and 400, except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the City Engineer.

That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against the property in the local improvement district described in said resolution and designated as and declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 116."

Passed by the Council this 9th day of February 1915.
