Let not the decree of Constantine be invoked as an example of that toleration which grants liberty to error, for whatever is permitted to error is a violation of the rights of the true religion. — La Lectura Domestica, (Madrid), quoted in the Morning Star, official Catholic journal of the archdiocese of New Orleans and the diocese of Savannah." (The elector desiring to vote affirmatively on the above question shall place an X mark in the space before the word 'yes'. If he desires to vote negatively, he shall place an X mark in the space before the word 'no'.

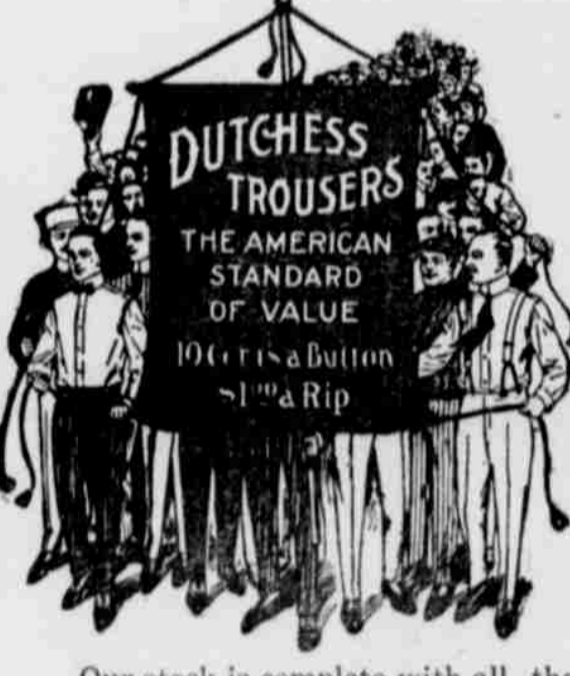
