A decided weakness of the Pacific northwest is its lack of manufacturing enterprise. Its productive resources in other lines are being too largely expended in eastern centers for the purchase of commodities that could be just as well produced at home. We depend upon the factories and the labor of far distant cities to provide us things we might just as well provide for ourselves. Opportunities for investment in industrial lines are being neglected while our money goes to keep alive the fires in eastern mills. Our workmen lack employment while we are supporting the payrolls in cities so far away we scarcely know of them. Here is a fertile field for the activities of commercial bodies and individuals interested in the development of the west. It is safe to say that there are openings here for not less than a half thousand new industries. Not million dollar concerns, subsidized with issues of stocks and bonds or large donations to burden the communities, but small industries where opportunities for development are great.

We should create an industrial atmosphere. We should be liberal in spirit toward capital seeking investment, through minimizing the retarding influence of legislation and antagonistic requirements which make manufacturing operations difficult. The nearer production and consumption are brought together the greater benefit will accrue to each. Business, especially large business, should, of course, be under proper supervision. Business recognizes this, and desires it, but supervision should not be carried to a point where it is too burdensome to permit profitable return. Commercial organizations in the small towns of the northwest, equally with those in the cities, can profitably turn their attention toward securing and promoting industrial enterprises. Payrolls are needed. The payroll district is the prosperous district. The tin bucket brigade is a great promoter of business communities. The northwest needs a larger tin bucket brigade.—Free Press, Cheney, Wash.

A doctor, commenting on the healthfulness of kissing, stated that, though many health reasons have been given why one should not indulge in a kiss, little has been heard on the other side. ORDINANCE NO. 665

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THE TIME AND MANNER OF IMPROVING LEONARD STREET FROM CHARLESTON STREET TO CHICAGO STREET IN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, OREGON.

The City of St. Johns does ordain as follows:
The Council of the City of St. Johns, having ascertained the cost of improving Leonard street from the West side line of Charleston street to the east side line of Chicago street in the City of St. Johns, as shown by the resolution of said city, dated on 18th day of May, 1915, and recorded in the office of the Recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, on the 21 and 28 days of May, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the City Recorder; and legal posting of notices of such improvements, as shown by the affidavit of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, and no remonstrance having been filed and as provided by said resolution, the Engineer's preliminary estimate of the cost of said improvement is \$2239.05, but shall be more accurately determined by said Engineer.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at sixty days from the last publication of notice of proposals of said work, which said proposals must be filed with the Recorder of said city on or before the 29th day of June at eight o'clock, p. m., of said day. That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the established grade by cut and fill and by sidewalk same on either side with 6 foot cement sidewalks and 12 foot curbs entire length, together with all necessary cement crosswalks and iron gutters, curb to have standard drain tile every fifty feet; hitch rings to be placed in curb as directed by the City Engineer.

The City Recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, the official newspaper, inviting proposals for making said improvement. Said improvement shall in all respects be done and completed in conformity with the provisions of Ordinances Nos. 160, 304 and 400, except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the City Engineer.

That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against the property in the local improvement district described in said resolution and designated as and declared to be "Local Improvement District No. 129." Passed the Council this 8th day of June, 1915.
