Fireman Peterson and other firemen are deserving of the highest meed of praise for their heroism in fighting the fire on the ferry boat Monday night. **"Got Wholluped"**

Peters the veteran catcher for the old Business Men donned the pad and mask for the first time this season and caught excellent ball. Art VanDolah the ex-heavy weight champion of Missouri caught a fine game for Linnton and upheld his part with the stick, as he smashed in the first two runs with a double. Wilson of Linnton came thru with some nice stick work, getting three hits, one a homer. Nelson, Larsen and Grover were pointers with their clubs while Monroe, Foss and Peters scooped 'em up with class in the field. The Willamette club plays Linnton at Linnton June 27.
