Investigation of municipal records of the town of Linnton, now a part of Portland, has revealed more debts than at first were thought to exist. It has been found among other things that interest is due for a year on \$17,000 in outstanding improvement bonds. This will cost Portland more than \$1000. Another item which has been brought to the attention of the Council is a promissory note issued by Linnton to J. A. Jones for \$500 for money borrowed with interest at the rate of 8 per cent. A bill has been received by City Auditor Barbur for \$201.40 from a local fire hose dealer for hose and other supplies purchased July 3. A stack of other bills has been received also by Auditor Barbur.

Makes Just Decision

Judge Gatens did a fine thing in his disposition of the Fowle case this week. It was the most just decision heard for a long time. He showed a full realization of the crimes of "society" and did not believe in punishing the woman and permitting the man to go unpunished and undisciplined. The fairness of the Judge is most refreshing and undoubtedly have a good effect toward equalizing the guilt in such occurrences.

Judge Gatens characterized the crime as one "such as is committed daily by many of the respectable married people of the country, usually for no other reason than a wish to avoid the responsibility and burden of rearing a large family."

"Is the taking of the life of the unborn child any less a crime than taking the life of a child one day old?" asked the Judge. "Why make an example of these two? Must this girl and her entire family be sentenced to everlasting condemnation and this boy be allowed to go absolutely free? I do not agree with society."

"The mother of this unfortunate girl had other children to bring up whom as she said 'would have to endure the sneers and jeers of society,' and half crazed by the thought of the disgrace which the birth of the child must bring to the innocent members of her family if made public, she, in her ignorance and desperation thought to save them, and committed this awful deed."

Judge Gatens censured the "double standard of morals which blames the woman and allows the man to go free."

"Bring these men into court," he said, "and make them stand trial with the girls upon whom they have brought or helped to bring disgrace, and soon we shall put an end to this sort of thing."

Owing to the fact that St. Johns has now become a part of Portland and the postal authorities are desirous that return addresses be inscribed on the corner of envelopes, the Review has decided to make a special offer for a few days on printing return cards on envelopes. Either way answers the same purpose. The 50 cents per hundred allows for name, street number and postage only. Additional lines come extra; also extra is charged where cuts are used. Leave your orders now.

Renewed Activity

With the annexation of St. Johns district to Portland renewed activity has started in behalf of Peninsula boulevard from Killingsworth avenue and Greeley street along the bluff overlooking the Willamette River through Lower Albina to Broadway bridge. The federated Peninsula committee has been awaiting completion of the merger before taking aggressive steps, and now it is planned to take up the matter with vigor. The merging of St. Johns will provide a much larger district to be benefited by the "cut-off," and consequently a bigger district to be assessed for the cost of the new street, materially reducing the cost to the individual lot owner. The first ordinance establishing Peninsula boulevard will go before the Council next Wednesday, according to plans of the federated Peninsula committee. Cost of the right of way is estimated at \$110,000, but this will be cut to about \$60,000 by condemning the old St. Johns wagon road, which the boulevard replaces. The principal opposition was found along Killingsworth avenue by property owners who fear such a boulevard would divert traffic from that street.—Oregonian.

It has been found by the Civil Service Board that owing to a provision in the city charter requiring a year's residence in the city before a person may take a civil service examination, residents of St. Johns and Linnton will not be eligible for any of the city's tests until after July 8, 1916. This applies to all employees of those two towns prior to their annexation to Portland.—Daily Abstract.
