

Department in Public

The following interesting and instructive paper was read by Miss Kathryn Scott at the Mothers' meeting of the W. C. T. U. Subject "Department in Public, and Why Girls Do Not Like Housework."

The following quotation from Ruskin seemed to be appropriate. He is giving advice to young women and says, "First, be sure of one thing, that however much you may know and what ever advantage you may possess and however good you may be, you have not been singled out by the God who made you, from all the other girls in the world, to be especially informed and qualified. The second thing which you may be sure of is, that however good you may be, you have faults; that however dull you may be, you can find out what some of them are; that however slight they may be, you had better make some, not too painful, but patient effort to get rid of them." For instance, can we not learn a little more self-restraint when others are talking, so that we may cure what is really a national habit, that of interrupting. Watch any group and see how rare is a good listener; how rare is that supreme of all courtesies—to let another talk without interrupting. Most of us are utterly unconscious of the manner in which we refuse to allow another to talk and finish what is being said without interruption. And yet there is not a more beautiful form of courtesy that permits another to speak and finish before we begin. And by the same token is there nothing more inconsiderate, more distinctly rude, than to break into another's talk and take from another the opportunity which is his or hers. Next to what we wear, we show our inmost selves more truly by our behavior in conversation than in any other contact in life. It is the man or woman of fine instinct, of a regard for the nicety of an occasion, who permits another to finish what he has started to say, who exercises that self control that stamps the person of gentle birth and does not interrupt.

A regard for appearances is, and should be, a leading consideration when ordering our conduct in public. It is not enough that we know ourselves to be above reproach; we must take care that the stranger who observes us gets no impression to the contrary. Friends who know her irresistibly mirthful disposition, may excuse the girl who laughs boisterously on the street car; but she will not be able to explain to the severe looking stranger opposite that she did not do this to attract attention. Conduct in public should be characterized by reserve. Greetings between acquaintances should be quiet and conventional. Remember to always be kind. Selfishness is vulgar, and an unfeeling habit to consider other people's comfort is mark of gentle breeding. A lady should say "Thank you," to a gentleman who gives up a seat to her on a street car or other public conveyance, where, having paid for a seat, he has a right to it, and his voluntary relinquishment of it is a matter of personal courtesy on his part. Let all bear in mind that it is impossible to be a lady, or a gentleman without gentle manners.

The best comrade for a girl is her mother. One of the most pitiable things in life is that so many young people do not appreciate their mothers at their full until they have left them. If their fresh minds could only believe that experience really brings mothers more up to date than they can possibly be and could realize what a real help and what a vital part their mothers might play in their lives. "If a girl behaves herself as she should no liberties will be taken." I cannot help thinking that it is the mothers mainly who have kept up this old tradition. I believe most mothers who are careful of their daughters, teach them that they can have pretty much the kind of behavior they want from a man, but it is not one mother out of ten, I am sure, who instills into her sons from the beginning that he can have the kind of behavior he wants from a girl and sees to it with all her soul that he wants only the best. Respect for women! Every woman has had it harped on that she should behave so as to command it, but how does it come that so little is said to the son of the country about self respect. Some parents we find who shirk their responsibility by saying "oh, times have so changed" since I was young, young people have more liberties these days." But such should not be the case. Both the son's and daughter's moral standard should be given by father and mother; it is for them to explain and direct; and just in so far as the young people adhere or depart from it, just so far do they reflect

their father and mother's ability or inability as parents. The parents are on trial, not the times and conditions. The ideal is that between daughter and mothers there shall be patience and love and that sympathy which follows a generous and mutual sharing of interests.
