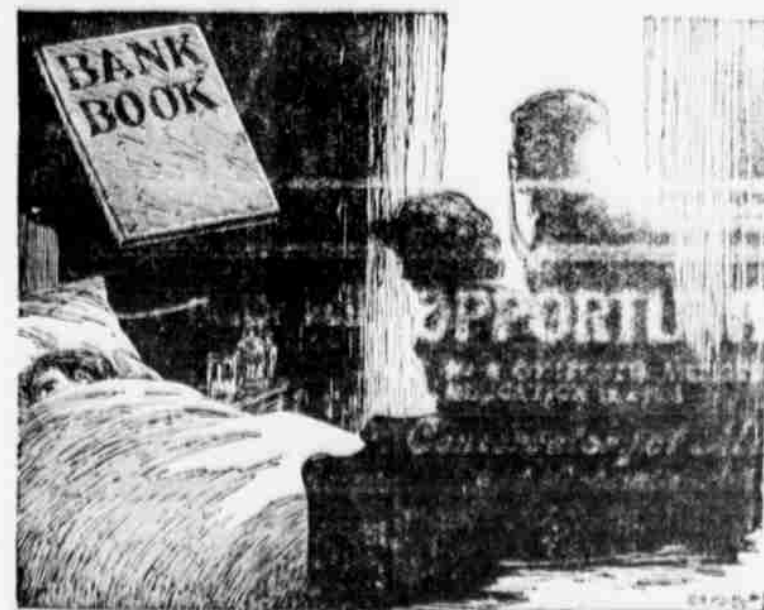
A new grocery store is opening up in the room adjoining Ely's store on Philadelphia street.
