The Liberty Bond drive in St. Johns has been proving an unqualified and splendid success. Practically everybody have been generously, sacrificing in some cases, and cheerfully and gladly in most cases, subscribing for the bonds. Up to this morning a total of \$396,900 subscriptions had been recorded at the Peninsula National Bank. The total will probably reach \$200,000 more when all are in. The ship plant, it is said, subscribed over \$300,000, the woolen mills was 100 per cent loyal, and other industries did nobly. It seemed to be the universal sentiment to buy bonds, and thus help in winning the war. St. Johns has proven itself intensely loyal at any and all times, and in the Liberty Loan drive it has fairly exceeded itself. Good for St. Johns.

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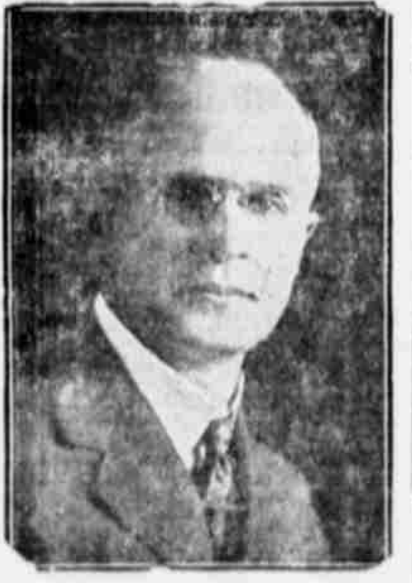

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Here is a brand new bread—try it on the family. Saves one pound of wheat flour.
BEAN BREAD.
1 1/2 cakes compressed yeast 1/2 cup lukewarm water
19x water 1 cup beans 2 tablespoons molasses 8 cups flour
5 teaspoons salt
Soak beans over night, drain off the water in which they were soaked and cook until soft in the 19x water. Put through a sieve or a potato ricer, cool and when lukewarm add (1) the yeast softened in the 1/2 cup of water, (2) the salt, (3) the molasses, and (4) the flour to make a stiff dough. Knead, let rise and bake.

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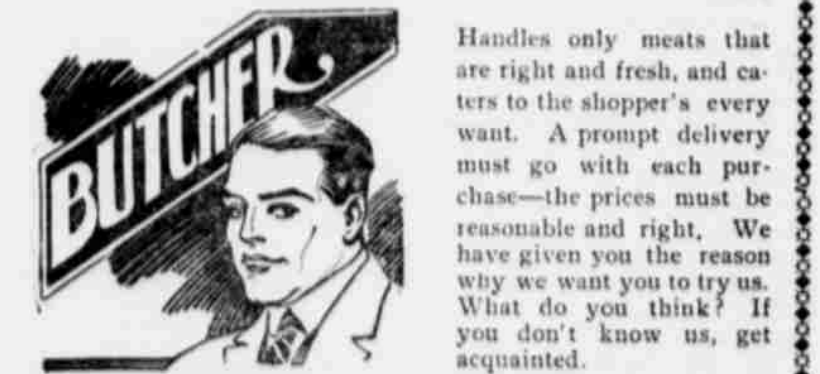
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
