The Liberty Bond campaign will continue until May 4th. Oregon and Portland have gone well over the top on the first jump, but it is desired that they still keep going until the campaign closes. So any citizen who failed to buy a bond from the solicitors who made the rounds last week still has opportunity to show his patriotism by helping Uncle Sam out. Besides being an aid to our beloved country in its time of need, it is a fine investment as well.

Shipbuilding plants on the Pacific Coast are far in advance of their schedule, according to Meyer Bloomfield, head of the industrial service department of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, who is on a tour of inspection of the shipbuilding yards on this coast. "The Pacific Coast is expected to turn out at least 30 per cent of all the ships required by the government," said Bloomfield. "The West seems determined to break all records." The war has been a terrible object lesson of how dependent this nation is on shipping in time of stress. Before the war, we had declined from one of the greatest to one of the smallest ship owning nations of the world. We had passed legislation which made it practically impossible for an owner to operate his ship under the American flag. To build up an American Merchant Marine after the war and perpetuate our great shipbuilding industry now so well established, it will be necessary for us to remedy our present legislation so that our ships may compete on an equal footing with the ships of other nations, and now is the time to consider such measures.

Miss Hunt, the Portland assistant librarian, has been very much in the limelight for several days, because of her refusal to purchase a Liberty Bond. Since her resignation has been accepted, she will have plenty of time to reflect upon her ingratitude in refusing to support the government that had been giving her support so generously. Perhaps, as time goes on she will realize more acutely the truth "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest of these it might have been, 'perhaps'." Because she is a woman, she is perhaps deserving of some pity that her judgment should become so beclouded. With her exceedingly generous \$175 per month salary, it would have caused no particular sacrifice on her part to have purchased a Liberty Bond, and thus aid her country in its time of need. When the young men of the land are offering up their lives in freedom's cause, is no time to reason whether we should give or not give. To know that our country that has nurtured and protected us, needs our financial assistance, that the brave boys at the front need our backing, is all need be known or considered. Not to render all the assistance in our power would be the basest ingratitude. Miss Hunt was most surely wrong in her contentions, as are any who believe as she believes. There can be no middle of road ground to stand upon now. We are either for the government, or we are against it. And unless we are for it, and will do what we can to aid it to the extent of our ability, we cannot claim to be good American citizens.

BEAN BREAD.

19x water	1 cup beans	1 1/2 cakes compressed yeast	1/2 cup lukewarm water
	5 teaspoons salt	2 tablespoons molasses	8 cups flour

Soak beans over night, drain off the water in which they were soaked and cook until soft in the 19x water. Put through a sieve or a potato ricer, cool and when lukewarm add (1) the yeast softened in the 1/2 cup of water, (2) the salt, (3) the molasses, and (4) the flour to make a stiff dough. Knead, let rise and bake.
