5 teaspoons salt 2 tablespoons molasses 8 cups flour Soak beans over night, drain off the water in which they were soaked and cook until soft in the 19x water. Put through a sieve or a potato ricer, cool and when lukewarm add (1) the yeast softened in the 1/2 cup of water, (2) the salt, (3) the molasses, and (4) the flour to make a stiff dough. Knead, let rise and bake.
