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CHAUTAUQUA TO HEAR U. S. MILITARY INSTRUCTOR

Government Work in This Country Explained.

C. J. Bushnell, instructor at Pennsylvania Military College and Special Instructor of the Officers' Reserve Training Corps for the U. S. Army, is to present at Chautauqua issues of the war from the "home" standpoint. Two lecturers have been requested by the



government on this summer's Chautauqua program, one to present the conditions abroad and one the home problems. Lincoln Wirt, war correspondent, in his lecture, "With Our Armies in Europe" will tell graphically of the European situation and Mr. Bushnell will present the governmental problems on this side of the water. He has been commissioned for this important lecture engagement because he is not only thoroughly posted on every angle of the war conditions at home, but also because he has the ability to present these facts from the platform in a clear and intensely interesting manner.
