Made Best Progress

With appropriate ceremonies and a great deal of enthusiasm, employes of the Grant Smith-Porter Ship company at noon Friday saw the initial raising of the "Best Progress" flag at their plant, given by the Emergency Fleet corporation officially for having shown the best percentage of progress in construction per hull of all hulls on the ways in the two week period ending with June 15. A chart prepared by Emergency Fleet officials shows the Grant Smith-Porter company to have made a 12.1675 per cent average gain in construction between June 1 and June 16, nearly 2 per cent ahead of the nearest competitor, the Supple Ballin company, whose gain for the period was 10.345 per cent.

The "Best progress" flag, designed in Portland and unique, as far as is known, to the eleventh shipping board district, over which L. J. Wentworth is supervisor, is a combination of international code flags which spell out the words "Best Progress." The set of flags will travel from yard to yard according to the best progress of work, as shown by the reports submitted to the Emergency Fleet offices on the 15th and last days of each month. The award of the flags each fortnight will be based solely upon the per cent gain per hull on ways irrespective of other considerations and conditions. Each successful builder will fly the Best Progress flag on the official shipping board flag for a period of two weeks, or until the next award is made to another yard for showing greater progress. Yards will receive a statement at the end of each period showing the pro-rata standing of all yards in the district.
