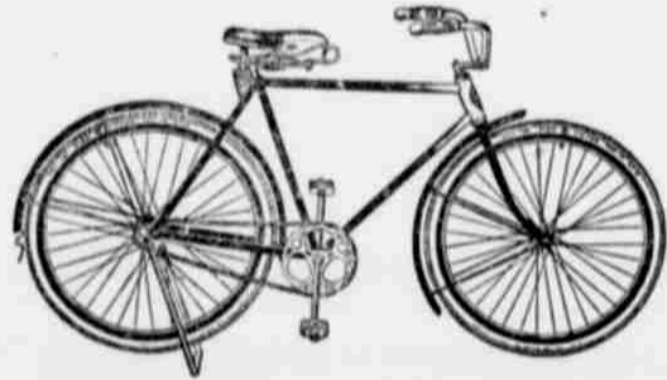

The foundation of the 1,000,000 bushel grain elevator is well along at the St. Johns Municipal terminal and footing for the powerhouse foundation and other parts are under way, but on the main building the work has slowed because the waterproofing is being applied before the side walls are carried higher. The steel reinforcing was delivered at a favorable time and columns are going in as well as the other labor on the ground, so it is believed the plant will be operating by the time 1919 rolls around. As interior elevators are beginning to handle bulk grain it is aimed to have the Portland plant ready for part of the cereal to be shipped to tide water. Already there have been receipts of the new wheat crop.
