The Port of Portland will receive bids at its general office in the Court House until 1 p. m. Thursday, September 12, for the construction of a coaling dock with trestle for railroad to be constructed near the municipal elevator at St. Johns. It will have a storage capacity of 10,000 tons of coal. Coal can be unloaded from the cars or boats directly into the bins. The new dock will supplement coaling facilities now afforded by the Pacific Coast Coal Company, which is enlarging its bunkers in anticipation of Portland's increasing shipping.
