Martha Jane Jones was born
in Findlay, Ohio, April 25, 1842,
and departed this life at the
home of her daughter, Mrs. C. O.
Rogers, 304 E. New York street,
St. Johns, Oregon, Sunday, Sept.
8, 1918, at the age of 76 years,
4 months and 14 days. In 1854
she moved with her parents to
Michigan. In 1860 she was united
in marriage to Wm. T. Davis,
with whom she shared the hard-
ships of early days in Southern
Michigan, where they lived until
Mr. Davis was called to de-
fend his country, he having
departed this life in 1892. To
this union were born eight chil-
dren, five of whom preceded her
in death. Mr. Davis departed
this life in 1892, she remaining
a widow 26 years. She was of
an unusually happy and loving
disposition, loved by all who
knew her, especially the young-
er ones who brought her beau-
tiful flowers. She modeled her
life after Him who died on the
cross, always willing to share the
burdens of others. In 1909 she
came to Oregon with her sister
and two daughters. She is sur-
vived by three children: Clarence
F. of Fenwick, Mich., Mattie
Davis of Toppenish, Wash., Mrs.
C. O. Rogers, St. Johns, Ore-
gon; an adopted daughter, Ida
B. Utting, Grand Rapids, Mich.,
one brother, William Jones,
Burlington, Mich., two sisters,
Barbara Connett, Kalamazo,
Mich., and Mary Barton, St.
Johns; 8 grandchildren and one
great-grandchild, who mourn
their inestimable loss.
