Final disposition of the Hillside boulevard litigation was made Monday, when Presiding Judge Tucker handed down his findings and conclusions, which stipulate that the property owners within this district must pay property assessments amounting to \$81,000. The litigation dates back to several years ago, when residents of this strip of property, between Portland and Linnton, took the initial steps toward constructing a scenic highway along the hillside above the Willamette. After preliminary work had been started the project was dropped. A year or two later Linnton became a part of the city of Portland and the City Council then levied an assessment of \$134,914.27 against the property. The property owners contended they should not be compelled to pay more than \$74,900, if they were to pay at all.

Mr. and Mrs. Cleve McClelland Eaton returned to Vancouver Saturday morning at 8:30 on the 4th Liberty Loan special train, from its tour of the state of Oregon, and joined the train which left Vancouver at 10:30 the same day. This trip will take in the state of Washington, including Seattle, Tacoma and Camp Lewis, Spokane, Bellingham, and Northern Idaho. The personnel of the train consists of speakers, soldiers, sailors, Belgian and French soldiers and two American Over Sea Boys. The train returns to Seattle on October 12. Mrs. Eaton was formerly Miss Ida Fassett.

During the recent American advance out of Chateau Thierry, a Red Cross captain was looking about for suitable hospital sites when he met an American negro soldier marching along toward Chateau Thierry, following close behind a German major. The negro had transferred his pack from his own back to the back of the German officer and had also transferred the German major's monocle to his own eye. Thus equipped the black warrior was parading triumphantly down the road. As he passed the Red Cross captain he called out: "I say, look here what this nigger done got."

To check profiteering among retail grocers there was appointed a price-fixing committee by Assistant State Food Administrator W. K. Newell, at Marshfield. On this committee is a representative of wholesale grocers, one representing retail grocers, a prominent local housewife, a man to represent labor unions and one to represent farmers. Each week a price list will be published, fixed at Washington, by which retailers must abide.
