What is considered to be the opening wedge in the manufacture was placed when the war industries board of this district received blue prints and specifications for trench knives, upon which manufacturers here are asked to bid in quantities of from 50,000 to 250,000. Secretary W. H. Crawford of the war industries board believes this is the forerunner of other orders that may be placed in Oregon, and is asking manufacturing here to submit bids for the proposed contracts.

In the appointment of Conrad P. Olson as justice of the Supreme Court by Governor Withycombe Oregon can be said to have a real representative of the common people on the supreme bench. Justice Olson has a statewide reputation as a lawyer and a legislator. In the city of Portland, where he is best known, he has won the full confidence of the people, and was continuously elected to the legislature since 1913, and has served in both houses. Had he not resigned as a senator to accept the appointment to the supreme bench he would undoubtedly have been the next president of the senate.

"Shame has driven many a man into the ranks," declared Lord Northcliffe, "and in this regard we have to thank the women of the nation for turning many a would be slacker into an excellent soldier. Several business men of St. Johns appeared in Council meeting yesterday to urge the repair of Jersey street hard surface. Shipyard traffic and other industries in that vicinity have worn the street badly, it was reported, and immediate resurfacing is necessary. Most of the St. Johns industries, which have a payroll of \$1,000,000 a month, use motor trucks for freight. Repair of the street is necessary if this traffic is to be taken care of, they said. The matter was referred to Commissioner Barbur, who promised that the street would be made safe for traffic. The present hard surface, he declared, was a patent imitation hard surface that was not capable of standing up under the traffic. Full repairs are not practicable at this time, he declared. — Thursday's Oregonian.

One thing that encourages an editor is to have a subscriber take his paper for five years or longer, for which he has never paid a cent, and then when settlement is insisted upon, to have the subscriber say: "I never ordered the paper." They know if they do that in many cases they would have to invoke the aid of the law in collecting payment for same. There are not many people in the world who will accept a newspaper for five or six years and then hide behind the subterfuge, "I never ordered it," when payment is requested. But there are a few.

Will Keep a Record

Whenever some great event in history comes to a people, it is, as a matter of regret, that records of those participating are not kept at the time, because, if delayed, the families are broken up or move away, friends scatter, and the chance to secure them is lost.

From the vicinity of St. Johns over two hundred and twenty-five men have responded to the call to the colors. It would be a matter of great interest to their friends and acquaintances as well as permanent historical value to be able to find the complete record of each man in service.

As the library is the logical place for keeping historical records and for supplying information the librarian of the St. Johns Branch is now establishing a card index bearing this information: Name of man in service, date of birth, date of enlistment, rank in Co. or Division, and history from his entrance up to the present time, to be supplemented as time goes on, filed together with his picture. The librarian, Miss Bowers, will endeavor in the next few weeks to call at the homes of the men in service and also would appreciate having any information brought to the library with pictures.

The material will be posted on a bulletin board for the benefit of the public and then kept on permanent file. Any special items of interest or kodak pictures of the men will be welcomed for posting and if the friends wish to keep these afterwards they will be returned, otherwise will be filed with the other information. — Ethel F. Bowers, Librarian.
