

Political News Letter

Ex-Governor West has not heard from Washington in answer to his request to endorse him for the United States Senate. It has been the custom of the administration to "lend a hand" to those candidates who are in sympathy with it. There has been so far no excuse offered by the republican candidates for the administration to "butt in" on the political situation here, and as our Senator and Congressman have stood "persona cum gratis" with President Wilson on all war matters, it will give the democratic candidates no excuse to make any charges of negligence in having advocated during the war every measure for conducting it to a successful conclusion. The only issues that may arise will be of a personal nature, which in the long run will have no effect when it comes to counting the votes. Mr. McArthur has a record of 100 per cent since he has been in congress and Senator McNary stands equally as well. Therefore it stands to reason that in our estimation the public do not wish a change at this time. Most of the Republican candidates for the county offices have no have no opposition, with but one or two exceptions. County Clerk Beveridge is opposed by W. L. Rickman and Judge Gantenbein by Lotus L. Langley. Otherwise the rest of them have clear sailing. In regard to the office of Justice of the Supreme Bench there are quite a number of them in the field. The present incumbent, Conrad P. Olson, seems to have the inside track even should his opponents "ring in" another who fortunately at this time carries the same ego-men. For City Commissioners there are now four candidates in the field. The present incumbents, Kellaher and Bigelow, are seeking to be elected again for the long term, while Horne and Pier are making strenuous efforts to supplant them. Arthur B. Baines has also entered the race at the last moment and it begins to look very interesting. Our old ex-Mayor, will be a candidate for the short term against Dr. T. L. Perkins, former State Senator. Dr. Perkins was elected and served in the 1913 and 1915 sessions as State Senator and was made chairman of the important Ways and Means Committee and in that capacity he assisted in passing the following legislation: The Widow Pension Act, the Compensation Act, The Act creating the State Highway Act, which Act made it possible to build the Columbia Highway and also the enabling act, which made it possible to build the Columbia River Bridge. In the 1915 session he was made chairman of the committee which drafted the present two payment tax law. In 1913 Dr. Perkins served as one of the Board of Governors for the Rose Show. Dr. Perkins was commissioned Commissary General with the rank of Colonel by Governor Benson in 1910, serving in that capacity for two years. He was a volunteer in the Spanish American War and served with Light Battery A Field Artillery. He has made his residence in this city since 1897. Dr. Perkins in accepting this nomination at the hands of his friends is not un mindful of the great responsibility placed upon him for the office as City Commissioner and should he be elected the public can rest assured that he will conduct the office to the best of his ability. Dr. Perkins is a man of executive knowledge and has at heart the city's future welfare. He is honest, efficient and perfectly trustworthy. He is a staunch adherent that all non-essentials should be absolutely excluded at this time when we are engaged in war, but at the same time we should not needlessly sacrifice efficiency in any of the departments, especially in the Fire and Police Departments.

Reclamation of industrial sites along the waterfront is included in the program of the Chamber of Commerce for harbor development, and it is probable that in the plans of the dock commission the filling of these sites in carrying out the dredging program will be included. The areas include Guild's Lake, Mock's Bottom, Columbia Slough, North Portland harbor and a large amount of land around the lower end of the peninsula. Ultimately, it is believed, the Willamette slough will be dredged to make a ship channel and Sauvie's island on the east and the mainland on the west, will be available. The alternative remedy in case the development is not undertaken by the dock commission or other port organizations, is a district reclamation law that will permit the private owners to make all heavy and costly improvement work. A survey of the lands in question is planned by the chamber as a part of its activities in preparing an out-
