Floyd A. Riley, aged one year and eighteen days, died at his home, 321 East Burlington street, November 4th, of pneumonia. He was the son of Fred Riley. The St. Johns Undertaking Co., had charge of the remains.

The glorious news of the great allied victory and the surrender of the kaiser's forces was greeted with the keenest satisfaction by the people of St. Johns. The whistles were blown, the bells were rung and a general rejoicing took place. A number of the industries closed down for the afternoon in honor of the glad tidings. The report later proved a little premature.

Frank Heck killed a good sized black bear and a cub on the Linton hill, just opposite of St. Johns, Wednesday morning. The bear has been on exhibition at Schlessler's meat market, where it has attracted lots of attention. The scarcity of food farther back is believed to be the reason the bear and the cub ventured so close to the more thickly settled region.

Emma E. Aus died at her home, 919 North Syracuse street, October 31st, aged 23 years and 21 days. She had been a resident of St. Johns for about three months, coming here from North Dakota. Influenza and pneumonia were the cause of her death. The remains were shipped to Nome, North Dakota, by the St. Johns Undertaking Co. for interment.

David Arthur Anson, a well known young man of St. Johns, and the son of J. H. Anson, died at his home, 111 Mohawk street, November 5th, of asthma. He was aged 36 years, 1 month, and 22 days. Arthur was born in Michigan and has made his home here most of the time for the past twelve years. He was unmarried. The funeral services take place today, Friday, the St. Johns Undertaking Co. in charge.

The Coe A. McKenna company has plans maturing for the erection of a large number of houses on property in the Peninsula district. The company owns between 690 and 700 building sites in University Park, Portsmouth and Northern Hill additions, easily accessible to the shipyards and other industries, and from 25 to 30 minutes by street car from the West Side business district. According to Mr. McKenna the houses to be built will cost from \$1000 to \$2500, and will be offered with the sites at from \$1500 to \$3000. Terms proposed are 10 per cent down and two per cent a month. Architects' plans are completed and construction will begin at an early date, according to Mr. McKenna.
