Teachers in Portland schools were denied the requested salary increase in Tuesday's election. The vote was 1873 favorable to the increase, with 2301 opposed, a majority of 428 against. The proposed salary increase amounted to \$20 a month to teachers receiving less than \$3000 a year and carried with it an additional tax levy of .8 of a mill with which to provide the additional \$230,000 necessary to meet the increase.

An after school study hall, with a teacher in charge has been instituted at the James John High for the benefit of those who wish to prepare their lessons at that time. The room is open as long as the students wish to stay, is kept warm and above all, quiet.
