Bertha has a new job. She is working for the United States. To be explicit, the Krupp plant at Essen, Germany, is turning out automobile parts for the Third army. Pinions and ring gears for certain makes of automobiles are not available in the A. E. F. Neither are wheel bearings. So the motor transport corps went to the Krupp works at Sayn, not far from Coblenz, and asked to have the parts made. The Sayn plant, however, did not have the facilities for doing such delicate work as cutting a bevel gear, and so referred the task to Essen—which is now hard at it. The Germans have also supplied some 3400 headlights for American automobiles, many of the lamps coming direct from Berlin. Essen lies about 80 miles to the north of Coblenz, in the Rhine valley, though not on the Rhine itself.

In preparation for the revival of export business the California Barrel company has acquired a site for its principal northwest plant at Vancouver, Wash. The site comprises almost 132 acres and is located about 1000 feet downstream from the plant of the Standifer steel shipbuilding yards, and has a frontage of about 2500 feet on the Columbia river. It is the expectation to ultimately establish a large plant that will afford employment to probably 1000 operatives and will represent an investment of \$500,000, but the site was acquired with the intention of going ahead with plans when business conditions justify.
