Big Time Saturday

Tomorrow, Saturday, will be a great day at the new elevator site when the oriental service will be started and the dedication services will be held. More autos will be no doubt be seen than upon any one occasion in St. Johns.

Thousands who contemplate attending dedication exercises are promised adequate transportation facilities, for in addition to many who will travel in automobiles it is being arranged to have a jitney service from the end of the St. Johns electric line to the terminal property. There is a possibility one of the river steamers also will be pressed into service, but that has not been settled.

Members of the Rotary club were on the ground Wednesday with Captain Moore, assigned by Chief of Police Johnson to assume charge of police details at the terminal, and space has been marked off on pier No. 1 for 350 automobiles. The Portland Ad club is to issue a most attractive souvenir programme showing the city's water transportation facilities and telling of the new oriental service to be started with the steamer West Munham. The Multnomah guard band has volunteered its services for the afternoon.

The cargo the West Munham is to carry across the Pacific is assembled on pier No. 1, the first of three big piers planned there. In addition to freight originating here, there are valuable consignments drawn from various sections of the east, bound through the Columbia river gateway to the land beyond the Pacific. State, county and municipal officials are to take part in the exercises, and besides the direct participation of the public docks body the Port of Portland commission has been asked to join as guest of the city.

EFFECT OF COLOR UPON THE DURABILITY OF PAINT.

Permanent coloring materials which have been ground by machine into a high grade white paint base have the effect of preventing "chalking" and "checking" two defects which are often observed when white paints are used.

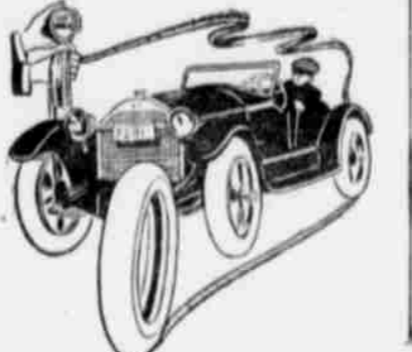

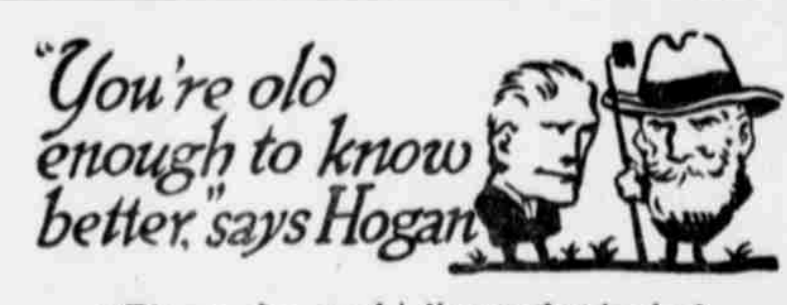
