The dedication of Unit No. 1 at the St. Johns terminal marks an important epoch in St. Johns' history. The elevator system, with what it will bring with it, means great things for this community. The Dock Commission displayed a wisdom in the selection of the site in this district that will be proven more and more as time goes on. By reason of the elevator system being located here greater and more far reaching interest will be taken in St. Johns than ever before. The only matter of regret at the dedication services Saturday was that there was not a St. Johns man listed among the speakers. This contingency should have been provided for, but the appropriateness of securing a speaker here was probably overlooked. The omission does not, however, in the least detract from the feeling of satisfaction and gratification on the part of our people over the fact that the great municipal elevator and terminal system of Portland is located at St. Johns, and it will ever stand as a monument to the far seeing wisdom of those responsible for its location on the lower peninsula.

The reception given last Tuesday afternoon in the Y. W. C. A. club rooms for Miss Henry, the newly appointed secretary, was a very pleasant affair. Forty guests came to express their interest in the local work and enjoy the program and social time arranged by the committee, under the able chairmanship of Mrs. Shaw. Mrs. Hagenbush and the Rainbow club had decorated the rooms attractively with spring blossoms and colors. Miss Jontz, the General Extension Secretary from the Central Y. W., was present, giving a greeting to the friends and thanking them for cooperation in the work in St. Johns. Miss Henry responded very graciously to her formal introduction, and all were convinced that she is especially adapted to the work, and will make a charming leader for the girls' clubs. Mrs. Borden, as chairman of the central foreign mission board, briefly explained the work, and Mrs. Northrup, as general chairman of the St. Johns Branch, expressed her appreciation of the work accomplished and the hearty cooperation of the whole committee and community. Mrs. Johnson, wife of our chief of police, is chairman of outside housing of girls for the Y. W., and she briefly spoke of her first attempt, as a sort of trail blazer, in looking for an opening and location of the Y. W. rooms in St. Johns. Miss Walker, the former secretary, was present, and expressed her regrets in leaving the girls and the club work, but is thoroughly enjoying her new work at the desk in the Central Y. W. and will be glad to greet the St. Johns people at any time. Mrs. Geo. Hall gave two very interesting readings and Mrs. Gabriel Fullen sang two charming songs. Miss Gambel, a national worker of the Y. W. C. A. and recently from New York City conferences, was also present, and sketched in a general way the work for girls that is being done all over the United States. Miss Gambel is working for the Girls Reserve in the Northwest district. After the formal program a delightful social time followed, with light refreshments. Mrs. Hagenbush presided at the punch bowl, assisted by Mrs. Bonham, Miss Randall and Mrs. Brand.

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A pool tournament is on at Glover's Pastime pool room and games are played each evening except Saturday and Sunday. 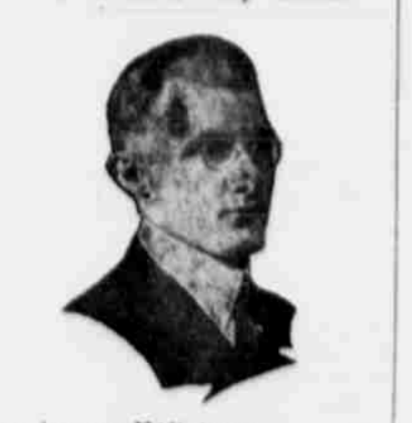
