Want Fair Treatment

From San Diego to Puget Sound, from Los Angeles and San Francisco and Astoria, comes demand for fair treatment for the shipping interests of the west. If there is to be a great merchant marine to hold our own for American off shore commerce with England and Japan, the operation of ships must be encouraged from Pacific ports. The great middle west from St. Paul to New Orleans is being aroused to the dangers of a shipping monopoly on the Atlantic coast and the necessity for a square deal for the west. The Shipping Board is a national body and charged with the duty of treating every part of our country with fair and equal justice in the distribution of shipping and handling commerce. Millions of tons of ships are necessary to handle the freight going out to the world from Pacific and Gulf ports, where it can reach the markets of the world most economically. Rail rates must be made fairly equal to give the farmer an opportunity to export his products from the ports that can naturally handle them the most economically. This cannot be done by stripping the Pacific and Gulf ports of tonnage and congesting freights as they are now congested in immovable quantities in a few Atlantic ports. For this reason the whole west is vitally interested in a national policy encouraging to the development of our ocean commerce. Political control of the shipping industry will always handicap the west, as it has in matters of public land, oil and water and power development. The east has the votes and plays politics with the west's resources.
