A Daily Vacation Bible School is to be conducted in St. Johns during the coming summer, under the auspices of the Multnomah County Sunday School Association. This school will be the first of its kind to be held in Oregon. Sessions meet from nine to twelve each morning of the week, for a period of two weeks, beginning on August 11. The movement for summer schools of religious instruction for boys and girls is popular in the East and South. The schools give religious training without any sectarian bias. The course of study includes choral singing, training in worship, graded Bible instruction, dramatization of Bible stories, character talks, plays and games. Expert teachers are employed. For the St. Johns School Harold F. Humbert, general secretary of the Oregon Sunday School Association, is to be principal. The teachers will be Miss Georgia Parker, Miss Violet W. Johnson, Miss Bernice Adams, Miss Vera Fuller. Classes will be conducted for pupils from the ages of four to fifteen. A local committee of arrangements representing the various churches of St. Johns has been appointed, consisting of Rev. A. P. Layton, chairman; Mrs. Burton, of the Baptist, Mr. Overstreet, of the Christian, Mr. Thurston, of the M. E. and Rev. Merrill, of the Congregational churches, members of the committee.

A dispatch from Salem to the Portland Journal yesterday says: Holding that the statutes do not confer discretion on the superintendent of banks or at the state banking board to inquire into business conditions and decide from that standpoint whether the organization of an additional bank in a community is justified, Judge George G. Bingham of the Marion county circuit court today upheld the alternative writ of mandamus issued in behalf of S. A. Mulkey and others interested in the organization of a new bank at St. Johns and ordered the state superintendent of banks to grant the charter asked for.

Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle announced this morning that the state banking board would continue to stand on its demurrer to the writ, on the ground that the circuit court has no jurisdiction in the matter, and will appeal the case to the supreme court as soon as the judgment is issued by Judge Bingham. Mulkey and a number of others were refused a charter for a new bank in St. Johns by Superintendent of Banks Will H. Bennett, on the ground that the field was already thoroughly covered and the organization of another bank was not justified. An appeal was taken to the state banking board, which upheld Bennett in his decision. Then the case was taken into the Marion county circuit court in order to compel the issuance of a charter.

Last Tuesday evening the Philo Christo class of the United Evangelical church held their regular monthly business meeting in Columbia Park, and in connection with the business meeting a picnic was held, and about 40 people were present and all report a good time and big eats. The class voted at this meeting to support a native worker in one of our mission fields in China, also a committee consisting of Mrs. Geo. Hall and Mrs. Althea Ogden was appointed to find out the cost of putting in cement walks at the parsonage with the view of having the work done. If you are eligible for membership in this class you had better join, as it is the class that does things.—Reported.

Approving plans for a sixth pontoon for the St. Johns dry dock, it having been determined recently to undertake the additional facilities, the Port of Portland commission has advertised for bids on the construction, to be opened July 10. In addition specifications for a steel hull, for the dredge Columbia have been approved, and an effort is being made to call for bids on that to be opened a week or ten days after the pontoon proposals are passed on. The public drydock has the original five pontoons with which it was placed in operation, and while the facilities have not been overtaxed by any single vessel, it is foreseen that with another pontoon not only a longer vessel can be taken care of but in handling smaller carriers more could be lifted at the same time than is now possible.

Mr. Earl Jayne and Miss Hazel Linquist were united in marriage at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Beam at 1:30 Wednesday afternoon, Dr. H. F. Jones performing the ceremony. Only the immediate friends of the young couple were present. The newly wedded pair will join Mr. and Mrs. Beam in a sojourn to San Diego, Cal., where they will remain for about six weeks.
