Knowles and is now on display at the St. Johns Harware store. The collection includes German breast plate, helmet that was to be used when the Germans entered Paris, shoulder straps, bayonet, gas masks, iron cross, vases made by German prisoners from French 75 shells, canteen, piece of shell that bursted close to the Lieu German automatic. pockethook, Austrian carline, and a number of other interest ing souvenirs. The collection is well worth seeing. Lieut. Knowles spent fifteen months in the war zone, and had some thrilling experiences.
