Hereafter City Auditor Funk  
will be given entire charge of  
the bookkeeping systems in each  
of the City Departments and  
will assure full responsibility  
with Commissioner Pier in  
keeping the accounts straight.  
There has been complaints made  
by City Auditor before the  
Council that a number of claims  
against the City had been paid  
twice owing to insufficient help  
in checking up, and to avoid fur-  
ther discrepancies and countless  
errors, Commissioner Pier finally  
designated Mr. Funk to place a  
competent accountant in each  
of the departments. By so  
doing Mr. Funk hopes to  
rectify any errors that may  
arise in the future.

The war tax on ice cream and  
soda water for the month of  
May and the war tax on lux-  
uries, such as shoes, shirts, mil-  
linery, etc., for the month of  
May will be due and payable  
at the office of Collector of In-  
ternal Revenue, Milton A. Mil-  
ler, on or before July 20. Blanks  
for the purpose of making re-  
port of these taxes have been  
generally distributed. Tax-  
payers who have not yet received  
them are urged to write to  
Collector Miller for the blanks,  
as the law provides penalty  
where payment is not made  
when due. Collector Miller is  
anxious to avoid the assessment  
of any penalties by the depart-  
ment, and this office will co-  
operate with the taxpayers with a  
view to bringing about com-  
pliance with the provisions of  
the Act without undue hardship  
and expense to the taxpayers.

Probably the most interesting  
and varied individual collection  
of war relics that has yet reached  
Portland, was brought here  
by Lieut. C. H. Knowles and is  
now on display at the St. Johns  
Hardware store. The collection  
includes German breast plate,  
helmet that was to be used when  
the Germans entered Paris,  
shoulder straps, bayonet, gas  
masks, iron cross, vases made by  
German prisoners from French  
75 shells, canteen, piece of shell  
that burst close to the Lieu-  
tenant, German automatic,  
pocketbook, Austrian carline,  
and a number of other interest-  
ing souvenirs. The collection  
is well worth seeing. Lieut.  
Knowles spent fifteen months in  
the war zone, and had some  
thrilling experiences.

Died at the residence, 1209  
Charleston street, June 28th,  
Stanley Borusiewski, aged 74  
years. Beloved husband of  
Josephine Borusiewski and  
father of Stanley Borusiewski,  
Jr., and Mrs. Philip. Funeral  
services were held Monday, June  
30th, at the St. Clements church,  
where requiem Mass was offer-  
ed at 9 a. m. Interment was  
made at Mt. Calvary cemetery.  
Arrangements were in care of  
Miller & Tracey, independent  
funeral directors. Cause of  
death, cirrhosis of the liver. He  
was born in Poland and resided  
in St. Johns the past five years.  
During the war he was employed  
at the Grant Smith shipyard,  
but was injured about six  
months ago and did not fully  
recover up to the time of his  
death.

Soldiers who have been dis-  
charged from the service must  
not wear their uniforms longer  
than three months after the  
date of their release, according  
to orders received from the war  
department. Men found guilty  
of infraction of the order are li-  
able to a fine of \$300 and six  
months' imprisonment.
