Bids were opened by the Port of Portland for the construction of a sixth pontoon for the St. Johns drydock. Robert Wakefield bidding \$129,262; the Coast Shipbuilding Company \$132,500 and the Northwestern Construction Company \$132,544. Mr. Wakefield wanted five months for the work, the Coast Shipbuilding Company 110 days and the Northwestern Construction Company 160 days. It is said when the dock was built the five original pontoons were constructed for \$160,000 and it was estimated the additional pontoon, allowing for increases of all kinds, would not cost more than \$80,000. Whether the Port will proceed with the work will be determined at the next session.
