P. S. Bannan, a White Salmon rancher, formerly a resident of St. Johns, is greeting old friends here this week.

The water supply is not any too abundant in some districts in St. Johns these evenings, especially when all the sprinklers are in operation.

Dan Williamson, who had been spending a couple of months in the White Salmon valley, has returned to St. Johns. Later he will return to White Salmon for a month or so longer. He says fishing is fine up that way.

One of the most pleasing features of the Chautauqua thus far was Mr. Whitney's "Turn to the Right," entertainment Wednesday evening. Mr. Whitney is a whole show in himself.

A heavy thunder storm, sharp flashes of lightning which struck at two or three places, and a copious downpour of rain were features that took place in Portland proper Wednesday morning. In St. Johns only a few drops fell, and while rumbling of thunder could be heard, sharp flashes of lightning were not observed. Strange the difference in such short distance.

The camping season is on. The greatest possible care should be taken by campers not to build large fires and to see that any they do build are thoroughly extinguished before they leave them. Also to avoid throwing cigar or cigarette ends about. Fire is a very dangerous thing in the forest. A big bonfire in front of camp at night is a pretty sight, but a little twig red hot and carried on the wind may start a forest fire.

Norman Anderson, 12 years old, was drowned in Columbia slough at the foot of East Twenty fourth street Tuesday while swimming with some other boys. The lad, who was not a strong swimmer, swam beyond his depth and sank before aid could reach him. City Grappler Brady recovered the body two hours afterward. The body was taken in charge by Deputy Coroner Calkins. The lad was the son of Mrs. Ida Anderson, of 148 Fern street. This is the third drowning in the Columbia river and slough in two days.

Hanging for perhaps two months, the body of a man was found suspended by a small piece of rope from the limb of a tree about 300 feet back in the woods from the Canyon road, near the end of Jefferson street Sunday afternoon. Absolute identification has not yet been established, but from writing found in a small memorandum book, marked Occident Flouring company, Minneapolis, discovered in the man's pocket, it is thought that his name was either John Stone or John Short.

Survey of proposed sites for new parks and playgrounds to be obtained by the sale of \$500,000 of bonds authorized by the voters at the special city election June 3, will be made today by City Commissioner Pier, Park Superintendent Keyser and members of the special committee composed of Dan Kela-her, Rev. John Dawson and W. H. Fowler. The survey party also will include Charles H. Cheney, consultant to the city planning commission, and W. J. Hofmann. Following the survey, a report will be submitted to the city council for a public hearing. The advice of the city planning commission has been sought by Commissioner Pier and this body also will have reports to be submitted to the council.

Mrs. Cynthia Sullivan, 60 years old, 5451 Bartmer avenue, St. Louis, went out to mail a letter. She found a box at Belt and Bartmer avenues. There was a broken glass in it and a sign, "Pull down the hook." She pulled down the hook, through the aperture caused by the broken glass, stuck the letter in the box and went her way. Hardly had she left when there was a clang of gongs and fire fighting apparatus filled the street in the vicinity. No fire was discovered and an investigation was begun. The letter was found in the fire box. It bore the return address, so a policeman located Mrs. Sullivan. "Why, I thought when I pulled down the hook somebody would come after the letter," she explained. She was informed several persons had come in response to her signal.
