When has there been such tumult? A hundred and fifty thousand railroad shopmen on strike in America! A Los Angeles lawyer's house dynamited and burned because he assisted in prosecuting radicals! White and colored in near civil war in Chicago! Strikes in full swing or incubating in many American cities, labor unrest all over the world! A night of riot in Liverpool described by a newspaper "as the most distressing night ever passed in a civilized city." Strikes of policemen, street car workers, railway operatives and mine workers in various parts of England! Where are we headed for?—Journal.

It is not generally known that the world's greatest oil wells today are located in Mexico. One well that was producing 50,000 barrels of petroleum daily for eight years past has been closed by flooding. This well in measured capacity turned out 120,000 barrels of crude oil per day in a steady stream for eight years. Another Mexican well at Cerro Azul, brought in in February 10, 1916, has a tested capacity of 310,000 barrels daily. On account of limited pipe line it has been throttled down to a flow of fifteen thousand barrels per day. While the English capitalists have oil interests in Mexico, America investments are still larger. The joint interest of our country and Great Britain in oil supplies from Mexico make friendly relations important. Oil may be the means of allaying all troubles on the waters of international strife between the two republics.

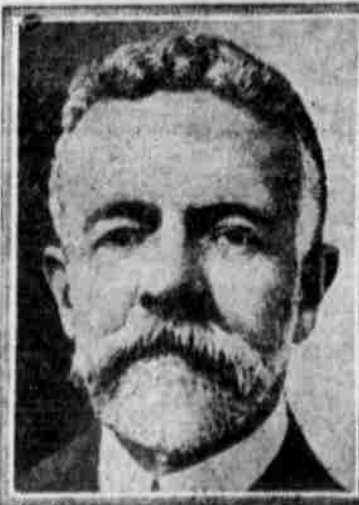
According to one reputable authority the nation is at least 46 per cent underbuilt. The same authority believes that the prices of materials will rule at present levels for 1919. It also estimates total construction for 1919 at 40 to 60 per cent of normal with lumber as cheapest building material. Our country is liable to lose six million alien laborers of whom 1,500,000 have gone or are going this year. This kind of labor is leaving New York at the rate of 1000 a week, and the supply of labor for industries is scarce. Lumber yards in New York and many eastern cities have less than one third of a normal supply, and demand is increasing. Of a hundred brick yards in a famous eastern clay products district, more than 70 are idle for lack of labor. Indications are that scarcity of buildings will continue through 1920 and that the demand for lumber will continue to increase.—Pacific Coast Manufacturer.

State War Savings Stamps Headquarters at Portland has learned that some few persons have been under the impression that they have lost the money they invested last year in Thrift Stamps, which they had not converted into War Saving Stamps before January 11, this year. This idea is, of course, entirely wrong. Thrift Stamps never change in value and are always convertible into interest paying War Saving Stamps without reference to the time they were purchased. It is advisable that Thrift Stamps be exchanged for Saving Stamps, however, just as soon as possible, inasmuch as Thrift Stamps do not earn interest, and because the price of a War Saving Stamp increases one cent each month during the year.

Great schools of whales. Quinalt salmon, pilchers and sardines relieved the monotony of the voyage of the shipping board's new 4000 ton wooden steamship Gray Eagle from Aberdeen to Seattle, which made its initial run last Friday. "We met one school of almost 40 whales off the Washington coast," said Captain Charles A. Wilson. They were following the smaller fish. The schools of Quinalt salmon, pilchers and sardines were so thick that you could not miss them. Some of the schools of pilchers were so thick that the waters turned over by our bows resembled a window of fish. I have never seen anything like it before. We seemed to be steaming through fish, not water."

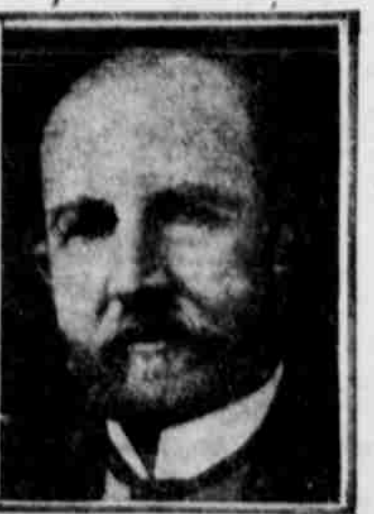
